PRESIDENT AT WORK AS SHIP SPEEDS EAST

Prepares Addresses He Will Deliver in France.

By Wireless to the Associated Press. ON BOARD THE UNITED STATES STEAMSHIP GEORGE WASHINGTON, Dec. 5.—The weather to-day was clear and cold, the pale sunlight making the escort observable from the decks of the President's steamship.

WILL SEND MAIL FROM AZORES.

The George Washington will steam by way of the Azores, but will not put in at those islands. A pouch of official mail will be put off there on Sunday and be hurried back to the United States on board a destroyer.

WILL EMPHASIZE NEED OF SACRIFICE.

There is every indication that in his utterances in France the President will make plain his proposition that all come to the peace table prepared to make sacrifices for a lasting peace and that armed domination by any one nation shall cease.

Yesterday was uneventful. President Wilson spent most of the first day of the voyage working in the office part of his suite. After acknowledging from the bridge the greetings that were given him as the ship put to sea he turned to the pile of letters and telegrams awaiting him and spent several hours working with his stenographers.
