

CZECHS EXPECTING SLICE OF HUNGARY

Hear Entente Powers Also Will Give Them Togoland, a German Colony.

POLAND ASKS FOR FOOD

Leaders of New Republic Fear Destitution Will Aid Bolshevik Agitators.

PRAGUE, Dec. 27 (delayed).—According to the report here the Entente powers have decided to give to Czechoslovakia the former German colony of Togoland, in West Africa, and a part of Hungary, so that the boundaries will conform with the historical frontier of Slavic territory.

Poland Needs Food Supplies.

PARIS, Dec. 28.—Unless Poland receives food supplies and clothing from the Allies immediately there is grave danger that the population, which is facing starvation, will join the Bolshevik movement and thereby menace the stability of the new government, according to Lieut. Stanislaw Hempel, aide de camp to Gen. Joseph Pilsudski, military head of the Polish Government.

Poland Ravaged by Germans.

The German army denuded Poland not only of foodstuffs, but carried off all horses and 80 per cent. of the cattle, so that it is impossible to cultivate the land. In addition, all wool and cotton were taken and the people are destitute of clothing, which is costing at the rate of 1,000 marks for a suit made principally of cotton.

HOLT READY TO BACK WILSON IDEA ABROAD

Editor Will Sail To-morrow to Represent League to Enforce Peace.

Hamilton Holt, editor of the Independent, will sail to-morrow on the Baltic to represent the League to Enforce Peace at conferences to be held in Paris by delegates from American and European organizations active in promoting a league of nations.

The immediate purpose of the league is to cooperate with similar organizations in Great Britain, France, Italy and other European countries in harmonizing our programmes so we may present a united plan for the support of both the peace conference and the world's public opinion.

Our chief task, after we form a united front will be to do all we can to support President Wilson in his efforts to commit the Peace Conference to the creation of an international organization whose fundamental purpose will be so far as possible, to prevent future wars.

Our instructions are to back up the President. This we expect to do by disseminating to the peace delegates the fact that the American people are with Mr. Wilson in his desire to make the formation of a league the most important part of the peace treaty.

Our second duty will be to send back to the United States information for the guidance of the campaign of education to be carried on by the league and kindred organizations here.

JEWS ASK EQUALITY IN PROMISED LAND

Poale Zionists Make Plans for Home in Palestine.

PHILADELPHIA, Dec. 28.—Suggested principles for incorporation in the proposed Jewish commonwealth in Palestine were agreed upon to-day at the national convention of Poale Zionists. It was agreed that the private ownership of land should be forbidden and that land should be the property of the State and community.

A minimum wage for workers is asked of the founders of the new State, Wages, it is suggested, should be a matter of State concern and not of individual control.

Colonization on the cooperative plan by which the poorest worker could start with some of the advantages of the richer is asked. It is proposed to raise money from a national Jewish labor bank to be lent to community units.

BRITISH AID TO U. S. TOLD

They Transport 51 Per Cent. of American Troops. The British Ministry of Shipping in this city made public yesterday official figures showing that about 51 per cent. of the American overseas forces were transported across the Atlantic in the ships provided by Great Britain.

In spite of the inroads made in neutral and allied shipping by the U-boat activities in 1916 and 1917, the data given out by the ministry shows that the transport facilities furnished by the Allies for American soldiers actually outdistanced the supply of troops ready for service before the armistice was signed.

PERSHING TIGHTENS CURB ON GERMANS

Lapses Force Adoption of Stringent Rules for the Occupied District.

ALL SPIRITS FORBIDDEN

Mails Censored and Use of Telephone or Telegraph Subject to Permission.

Must Deliver All Arms.

PARIS, Dec. 27 (delayed).—Rules for the guidance of inhabitants of regions occupied by American forces were issued to-day by Gen. Pershing. Except for minor and specific regulations the Americans have not interfered in local affairs until to-day.

The regulations, published to-day were signed by Brig.-Gen. James W. McAndrew, chief of staff, by command of Gen. Pershing. In drafting them an effort was made to avoid the inclusion of any rules which merely would humiliate the population or which

involved retaliation or revenge. They are intended simply to maintain good order.

The text of the proclamation follows: "Every person above the age of 12 must carry at all times an identification card bearing his signature and address. Such card will, when issued, be stamped by the appropriate civil official. Notification of change of address must be immediately made to the appropriate civil official and endorsed by him on the identification card.

"Circulation will be controlled by the American authorities. The burgomaster, under the direction of the American authorities, will regulate travel within the district occupied by Americans, and he will be held responsible for strict compliance with all regulations.

Stringent Special Rules.

"The use of carrier pigeons is forbidden. Owners of carrier pigeons will make immediate report of their pigeons to the military commander, with a list of the marks borne by their pigeons. Pigeon houses must be kept open day and night.

"All gathering of crowds is forbidden. No meeting or assembly of persons shall take place without authority from the local military commander. Sessions of courts, councils and schools, as well as religious services, may be held as usual.

publication will be delivered to the local military commander immediately upon issue, and the appearance of any matter reflecting upon or injurious to the American military government will render the publication liable to suspension or suppression. Excepting the periodical press, no printed matter will be published without permission from the local military authorities.

Ignorance Is No Excuse.

"Miscellaneous.—The term civil authority used in these regulations means the Burgomaster, or head of the local community. "All applications for permits or passes must be made in writing to the local American military authorities through the civil authorities. Every person must familiarize himself with these regulations and all others hereafter

made by the American military authorities. "Ignorance of these regulations will not be accepted as an excuse for their violation. In case of doubt as to the requirements of these regulations, inquiries should be made at the city hall."

BOAT BATTERED IN LONG TRIP.

Schooner Loses Foremast During Run From Africa. VINEYARD HAVEN, Mass., Dec. 28.—A long and somewhat perilous voyage was almost ended when the schooner Francis J. McDonald, of 969 tons, arrived here to-day. The schooner, which is bound for Boston, left Port Elizabeth, South Africa, on August 5. During her slow passage she encountered repeated storms in which she lost her foremast. All the other sails were split.

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FALL KILLS FLIER IN TEXAS.

Flight Instructor With Him Severely Injured. FORT WORTH, Tex., Dec. 28.—Sergeant G. B. Haskell of Sagamore, Mass., was killed, and James P. Moore, flight instructor of Barron field here, was severely injured, in an airplane accident in Killebuck county, many miles from a railroad.

SINN FEINERS START REPUBLIC

Encouraged by Election of Seventy Members of Parliament.

LONDON, Dec. 28.—Posters will appear in every parish in Ireland to-day announcing that the Irish Republic has come into being, says the Express.

The newspaper adds that the Sinn Feiners in the recent election swept Leinster, Munster and Connaught. Seventy members of parliament were elected by the party, but they will not take their seats. It is stated by the Express that a central Sinn Fein Council will be established in Dublin almost immediately and will call itself the Irish Parliament. If the government orders its disbandment, it is stated, it will establish itself elsewhere and, if necessary, move from place to place.
