MILITARY DICTATOR IN ARGENTINE ROTTS. General Assumes Absolute Power in Buenos Ayres to Quell Strike. SHOOT TO KILL IS ORDER. Government Forces Supplemented by White Guard, Marines and Sailors.

By The Associated Press. BUENOS AIRES, Jan. 10.—Gen. Dellepiane, commander of the forces opposing the strikers throughout Argentina, has taken over all the forces of the Government. This action, it was explained, in nowise constitutes a measure unfriendly to President Irigoyen.

Battles in the Streets. At 11 o'clock to-night battles between strikers and police were raging in all parts of the city. There was a particularly sharp conflict in front of the post-office.

Newspapers Are Burned. The strikers began the day by shutting into every business house which attempted to do business with them. They devoted their energies to burning privately owned automobiles.

They asked enactment of the pending bill providing Government control of packing plants, stock yards, refrigerator and stock cars.
