

Edward C. Beal Winner of North and South Amateur Golf Title at Pinehurst

NORTH-SOUTH GOLF TITLE FOR BEAL Defeats Newton in Final Match of Championship Tourney at Pinehurst.

HOLES ARE TAKEN AT PAR Best Golf Played in Second Sixteen—Three Extra Holes—Matches Decided.

Special Dispatch to The Sun. PINEHURST, N. C., April 5.—Edward C. Beal of Uniontown won the North and South amateur championship title at Pinehurst today, defeating F. C. Newton of Brookline by 4 up on the thirty-third hole of the thirty-six hole final contest played on the No. 2 course.

Beal started with a rush, taking four of the first six holes in par, but by the time the sixteenth hole was reached Newton had reduced his disadvantage to 2 down. The first round ended with Beal 3 up, the Uniontown golfer sinking a fifteen footer for a winning 4 on the eighteenth.

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Canadian Golf Def Accepted by the U. S. HOWARD F. WHITNEY, secretary of the United States Golf Association, announced yesterday that the executive committee of the parent organization has accepted an invitation for an international team match with Canada.

The invitation was sent following a meeting of the Royal Canadian Golf Association recently. It was suggested that the matches be decided the two days following the open championship at Hamilton on August, and the Canadian officials expressed the hope that a few of the American team would arrive in time to compete in the event.

The last international competition between the countries was in 1909 at Quebec, two meetings having been held before that. The United States team won on all three occasions.

BRACKETT SAVES DAY FOR COLUMBIA Former Soldier's Victory Over Smellie of Navy Decides Fencing Championship.

Robert Brackett of Columbia, a soldier who came home from France suffering from shell shock, last night saved his team from defeat in the intercollegiate fencing championships in the ballroom of the Hotel Astor, when he defeated E. F. Smellie of the navy in the final bout of the night by 15 to 14. Incidentally it also enabled Columbia to retain the championship.

The victory of the representative of the Blue and White was carried from the meeting by the crowd, who were of his jubilant teammates, who filled the ballroom with their cheers. The navy team needed only one more victory to tie the contest with the other, Columbia's score being 36 and the navy's 25. Had Smellie won the bout it would have given the championship to the navy, for Smellie had defeated the Columbian by 5 to 4.

But Brackett apparently was determined that the Navy should not win, and through the contest was the closest and most bitterly fought of the tourney, the two who had won khaki never faltered or lost courage. Fencing with the greatest brilliancy, he kept on even terms with his formidable opponent and by scoring three touches in the final minute of play changed what appeared to be certain defeat into a well won victory.
