

VICTORY LOAN HERE NOW OVER BILLION MARK

Official Total \$970,143,400 With Many Subscriptions Not Compiled.

DAY'S GAIN \$175,770,100

Country's Total Is \$2,818,561,000, or 62.63 Per Cent. of Goal.

With a gain yesterday of \$177,700,100 the New York district jumped into third place among the twelve Federal Reserve districts in the campaign for the Victory Liberty Loan. This represents an advance from tenth position since last Monday, and with the exception of Wednesday's figures the greatest to date during the Victory Loan drive.

The district's official total last night was \$970,143,400, which with subscriptions known to have been made, but not yet officially reported, will put the grand total well over the billion dollar mark. This is 71.8 per cent. of the district's quota and compares with 53 per cent. of the quota that was reported at the same period of the Fourth Liberty Loan.

New York city is in advance of the rest of the district, having officially reported last night \$774,665,000 or 77.4 per cent. of its quota of \$1,000,000,000.

\$2,818,561,000 Nation's Total. Total subscriptions for the entire country as reported by the Treasury Department last night were \$2,818,561,000 or 62.63 per cent. of the total of \$4,500,000,000.

Officials said yesterday that beyond doubt the completion of the treaty and its presentation to the German delegates had done much to stimulate subscriptions in the closing days of the loan drive.

With two days left the New York district must report a total of \$879,850,000 in order to meet its quota, or an average of \$439,925,000 for each of the two days.

While there is no possibility of a loss of the quota, it is not impossible that during the remainder of the drive, officials last night were hopeful that this average would be struck. It was pointed out that subsequent to the same period in the last drive more than \$1,000,000,000 in subscriptions was received. This is not expected this time, for one reason because the number of individual subscriptions still remains disappointingly small.

Information that reached Second Avenue headquarters last night was believed to justify the belief that the quota would be met or exceeded.

Benjamin Strong, Governor of the Federal Reserve Bank and chairman of the Victory Liberty Loan committee, last night issued the following statement:

"Messages from some of the principal cities of the Second Federal Reserve District outside of New York city indicate generally that satisfactory returns are coming in throughout the district. Delayed subscriptions are being collected rapidly and in gratifying amounts.

"When one considers the attractive interest rate of 4 1/2 per cent., with its extension to 5 per cent. on the 4 1/2 per cent. that subscribers for amounts up to \$10,000 will be allotted the amounts of their subscription in full; also the very large tax exemption which is being given to 4 1/2 per cent. notes for those who pay heavy surtaxes, no one can be surprised that subscriptions are now piling up rapidly.

"The fact that two business days left in which subscriptions will be received by the banks and trust companies and those who have delayed subscribing should do so at once."

Astor Takes \$4,000,000. Vincent Astor headed the list of individual subscribers yesterday with a total of \$4,000,000, which was credited to the United States Navy Victory Loan committee of the Third Naval District. Other large subscriptions were from the Atlantic City and West Indies Steamship Lines and the American Telephone and Telegraph Company and associated companies.

The Rainbow Livestock and Poultry Trades committee added \$52,903,780 to its total yesterday, bringing its figures to date to \$307,694,480.

"Pegginio" Garibaldi, as Gen. Giuseppe Garibaldi, popular Italian hero and grandson of the Liberator is known, will be the principal speaker at the big loan rally in Madison Square Garden to-morrow night under the direction of the Italian Victory Liberty Loan Committee, cooperating with the American-Italian Chamber of Commerce, the foreign language bureau of the Government Loan Commission and many Italian organizations.

Beginning at 12 noon to-day will be inaugurated in the "Argonne Forest" in Times Square. Prominent speakers and entertainers will conduct a ceaseless relay for notes subscriptions until the campaign closes at midnight to-morrow. Five hundred policemen have been relieved from duty to-day and to-morrow, the closing days of the campaign, to devote their entire time and effort to the sale of Victory Notes. Five men were selected in each precinct and the remainder from among other department men.

Cleveland, May 8.—Victory Loan subscriptions in the Fourth Federal Reserve District reached \$130,460,000 and Cleveland subscriptions \$54,776,130 at noon to-day, according to official announcement.

Baltimore, May 8.—More than \$6,000,000 was subscribed to the Victory Liberty Loan at an enthusiastic meeting here to-day, following an address by Ole Hanson, Mayor of Seattle.

San Juan, Porto Rico, May 8.—The Victory Loan committee to-day reported total subscriptions of \$1,600,000. It is announced that there is increasing interest in the loan in Porto Rico.

The best gain for the day was made by the New York district, which moved

into third position ahead of Chicago and Boston. St. Louis district maintains the lead with Minneapolis a close second. Philadelphia gained over Atlanta and Cleveland, while San Francisco and Dallas occupy the tail end places.

Officials calculated to-night that if the average of the last two days is maintained the total reported officially by Saturday night when the drive ends will be between \$1,250,000,000 and \$1,500,000,000, which will leave approximately a billion dollars to be reported as a result of the final count. In previous drives related subscriptions not included in the closing total have exceeded this figure so that the Treasury officials to-night were more sanguine over the outlook than at any other time in the present campaign.

Another reason for the belief that the last minute figures may be even larger than in previous loans is seen in the Treasury's announcement that over subscriptions will not be accepted unless they are in blocks of \$10,000 or less. The suggestion has been made that at the last moment large corporations will enter subscriptions for more than they actually expect to get in the belief that their allotments will be pared down. No company's quota of \$10,000 or less are to be rejected.

Small orders are just as much desired, or even more so than large subscriptions, it was pointed out to-day in a Treasury statement, because the soundness of the loan depends to considerable extent upon the wide distribution of the securities. The race for first place among the Federal Reserve districts seems to be between St. Louis, Minneapolis and New York.

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POLICE IN CLASH AT MOTOR PLANT STRIKE

Overland Factory Closed—10,000 Men Reported Out.

TOLSON, O., May 8.—The plant of the Willys-Overland Company was closed late this afternoon by Clarence A. Earl, vice-president of the company, following a clash between strikers and police in which bricks, stones and clubs were used as weapons.

The trouble resulted when several hundred strikers attempted to talk with employees who had refused to join their ranks. Nearly 100 policemen were rushed to the plant when a citizen reported a


disturbance. Headquarters was notified that crowds were gathering in the streets and menacing the police already there and non-strikers.

It was announced later by Henry F. Herbert, Chief of Police, that none of his men was injured. All traffic policemen were taken from the streets and ordered to report at the plant.

Labor officials claim 10,000 men are on strike. Vice-President Earl gave out a statement to-night that the plant will be closed indefinitely to "protect the lives of the workmen."
