

MOST OF A. E. F. OUT OF EUROPE BY JULY 1

Three Rhine Divisions and Some Small Detachments Only to Remain.

RETURN OF MEN SPEEDED

Pershing Starts After Troops Debar and Chaumont Headquarters Move.

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Paris, May 18.—Orders issued within recent days will bring the final passing of the American Expeditionary Force by the end of next month.

More than 1,000,000 Americans have gone home and the many bases and headquarters that were established here now have little reason for existence.

During the month the American general headquarters will leave Chaumont, relinquishing to French troops there the gray stone barracks building where victory was planned.

Except for Tours the intermediate zone will be vacated, comprising such places as La Maa, Saint Aignan, Givres, Nevers, Chateauroux, Orleans and Blois.

Orders just issued will take off special leave trains for the A. E. F. units.

The A. E. F. university at Beaune will close June 15.

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IS FORD PRIVATE OR PUBLIC CHARACTER

Status as Citizen Will Have Bearing on Million Dollar Libel Suit.

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MIDDLE WESTERNERS REACH PHILADELPHIA

The Haverford Brings 2,145 Doughboys From Brest.

PHILADELPHIA, May 18.—Soldiers from the middle West, made up of the bulk of the 2,145 troops who arrived from Brest on the American Line steamer Haverford, from Liverpool and Brest.

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WARSHIP BRINGING 1,000

The Rhode Island Due to Reach Boston To-day.

BOSTON, May 18.—The battleship Rhode Island, which is bringing 1,000 troops from Brest, will arrive at Fleet Roads at 9:30 to-morrow morning unless delayed by a fog through which she was passing to-night, according to a message received by the Naval Communication Service.

Units on board include the 107th Signal Battalion, Sales Commissary Unit No. 232, ten ambulance sections, two sanitary squads, two service park units and seven casual companies.

A delegation from Ypsilanti, Mich., will go down the harbor to greet troops from that State who are on board.

PARADES FOR JERSEY TOWNS. Troops Will Stop to-morrow on Way From Merritt to Dix.

TRENTON, May 18.—Adj.-Gen. Glickson announced to-day the movement on Tuesday of the 113th Infantry, Twenty-ninth Division, en route from Camp Merritt, where it is undergoing quarantine, to Camp Dix for demobilization allowing more than two hours each in Jersey City, Newark and Trenton, for parades of the fighters. As each man carries a pack weighing about seventy-five pounds in addition to war trophies, the War Department has requested the municipal authorities in each city to curtail the parade routes.

The 113th Infantry, Seventy-eighth Division, made up of New Jersey drafted men, will arrive at Trenton, Pa., and after quarantine the units coming from Jersey City, Newark, Trenton and Atlantic City will parade in those cities.

Adj.-Gen. Glickson will meet the returning Jersey troops at Newport News, Va., Tuesday, and Newton A. K. Busbee, State Comptroller, of this city, representing the acting Governor, will welcome other New Jersey units arriving Wednesday, Thursday and Friday.

WILLARD SEEKS EXTENSION. Wants More Time to Complete Business Before Going to Toledo.

TOLEDO, Ohio, May 18.—Jesse Willard, the heavyweight champion, matched to meet Jack Dempsey here July 4, to-night telegraphed Tex Rickard, promoter of the contest, requesting an extension of time in reporting here for training, so that he might finish some business affairs in Los Angeles. Rickard reluctantly consented to the request, but advised that the fight would be expected May 24.

"I want both men on the scene, so the public can judge for itself the merits of the boxers," Rickard said. "Dempsey has more than carried out his end of his agreement. It's up to Willard to do the same. However, I do not want to interfere with the personal affairs, and if he is training on the coast, I have no serious objection to a delay of a few days."

TO DEMAND HIGHER WAGES. Textile Unions at Lawrence Will Ask 15 Per Cent. Jump.

LAWRENCE, Mass., May 18.—A delegate from one of the local unions affiliated with the United Textile Workers of America announced at a meeting of the Central Labor Union to-day that a demand for a 15 per cent. increase in wages would be submitted to all the mill owners here to-morrow. The Central Labor Union voted to support the demand.

The unions affiliated with the United Textile Workers, comprising only a small percentage of the mill workers here, have not participated in the general strike which began on February 5.
