

VENDER OF MONEY MACHINE IN TOMBS

Louis Veronach, Alleged Gypsy Swindler, Brought From Pittsburgh.

Louis Veronach, a Hungarian gypsy violinist, alleged to be the leader of a band of swindlers who during the last few years are said to have taken in numerous victims with the ancient money machine game, cleaning up more than \$100,000, arrived here yesterday from Pittsburgh in the custody of Detectives McCoy and Gegan. They went to that city to arrest him on warrants issued by Judge McGuire in General Sessions April 8, 1918, in which he was charged with grand larceny and acting in concert with nine others in swindling operations.

Veronach was arraigned yesterday before Judge William H. Wadhams in General Sessions and, since jumping bail is an accomplishment that has been displayed by him on several occasions, he was remanded to the Tombs without bail.

The shaggy haired violinist, though capable of earning a respectable living as a professional musician, is said to have been unable to resist the lure of separating the simple folk from their money while he found that there were many of them who had still to learn that currency notes are turned out by Uncle Sam's Treasury and not by patented money chests.

early last year Veronach has run detection a race through Cuba, Mexico, Texas, California and Indiana. They camped on his trail several times in various parts of the country, but he finally succeeded in eluding them.

But for the beautiful nature of a prosperous delicatessen store owner in Pittsburgh who had thought so well of Veronach's money box that to become partner owner he gave him \$4,000 in cash and his daughter in marriage in lieu of \$14,000 more, the gypsy fiddler might still be at large in the Smoky City.

The detective said Veronach had told them on the train that he supposed this would be the end of his swindling schemes and he might as well plead guilty and be sent to Sing Sing to join his confederates. "But I wish you could let me go," he said in a regretful tone. "I could still get that \$14,000, because the old man believes as much as ever in our little box."

Veronach, variously known as Samuel Gerz, Louis Krol and George Batoni, is also wanted by the police in Chicago for a \$1,600 swindle a year and a half ago in which he is said to have been implicated, with other members of his band. He jumped \$5,000 bail bond and escaped prosecution on the Chicago charge. According to the police records, Veronach under one or another of his several aliases, was involved with members of his band in a \$42,000 swindle in Pennsylvania, another in this city in which he is said to have defrauded a man named Wallus out of \$3,400 and still another perpetrated upon a man named Carl Schulte in Fort Jervis, from whom \$4,800 was alleged to have been taken. All these swindles took place within the last year and a half and the money making machine is said to have served as the glided bait for each one. Since he forfeited his bail bond here
