

LABOR WILL WAGE STEEL MILL WAR

Fight for Unionizing of Employees to Begin in Pittsburgh District.

BACKED BY FEDERATION Committee Headed by Gompers Will Attempt to Organize 400,000 Workers There.

ATLANTIC CITY, June 16.—A final fight between the American Federation of Labor and the great steel corporations of the country for the unionization of employees in the steel plants was decided upon here to-night.

The presidents of the unions represented at the conference pledged themselves to go to just necessities.

The decision to inaugurate the fight for unionism was reached after one of the most protracted sessions of the conference.

Cities Victory Over Packers. Mr. Gompers told members of the committee that the workers in the meat packing industry recently had achieved their ends and that he was "convinced" that the organization of the steel industry could be completed just as quickly.

"The iron and steel men are powerful and have wealth beyond the ken of most men and the money they have is a sharp one," warned Mr. Gompers.

"We want to bring new life to the workers in the steel industry and we are going to do it by means of a speech, free assembly and free press.

Fitzpatrick to Be Leader. Mr. Gompers refused to accept the chairmanship of the committee which will take charge of the fight, saying that he could not spare the time to handle it properly in view of his other duties.

IRISH RESOLUTIONS IN PEACE COUNCIL

Action of American Congress Formally Transmitted.

PARIS, June 16.—The resolutions adopted by the American Congress on the Irish question have been transmitted formally to the Peace Conference, Frank P. Walsh and Edward P. Dwyer, the delegates representing Irish societies of the United States, have been informed.

The House of Representatives in the early morning of March 4, the last day of the regular session of Congress, adopted by a vote of 218 to 41 a joint resolution in which the hope of Congress was expressed that the Paris Peace Conference would favor self-determination for Ireland.
