

CHALONER BIDS CITY A POETIC FAREWELL

John Armstrong Starts for Virginia and Will Go Later to Toledo.

PLANS TO ATTEND FIGHT

Leaves Sonnet Praising N. Y., but Urging a Change in Law.

John Armstrong Chaloner departed "his" New York yesterday afternoon with his accustomed flourish. He is motoring to his Virginia home and then on to the Willard-Dempsey fight in Toledo. He will come back to New York in July to press the petition which his lawyers, Strousand & Ware, have filed with the Supreme Court asking that Thomas T. Sheran be discharged as a committee of his property and that the property be returned to him.

Through his family, the former Lieut.-Gov. Lewis Stuyvesant Chanler, Sheriff Job, to whom he sent the "Who's Loony Now?" telegram, and his other brothers and sisters are reported to have been reconciled to him through the efforts of the women of the family, he is taking no chances on the expiration of the writ of protection granted to him by the Federal courts to permit him to press certain libel suits here. He will not be legally sane in the State of New York until the writ of protection shall have been granted him. He took two Farishian shots at the lunacy law—in sonnet form—just before he left yesterday.

"My safe conduct is about to expire," he said as he packed himself, his faithful servant, Grady, and his many bags and books into his comfortable sedan car in front of the Brevoort at 1 o'clock. "And I'm off on the three-day trip to Merry Mills. From the Merry Mills I go to Toledo and attend my regular fight—front row—at the Willard-Dempsey fight.

"I am a strong believer in the many art of self-defense as a study, knowing that the only way to advance the science is to have finish fights. All this talk about brutality touching a fight to finish springs from ignorance or hypocrisy.

"I know from experience that there is absolutely no pain in being knocked out—one drifts off into a dreamless sleep—that's all. Gillard knocked me out in our encounter in the dining room at the Merry Mills, March 15, 1909, and I recovered before the contest was over than half up, and rose and toed the scratch—so I know whereof I speak."

Then, when asked about his legal status here, Mr. Chaloner replied in drawing from his pocket a manuscript containing the two sonnets. They were written before the verdicts favorable to him were rendered by New York juries in the Federal Courts, but Chaloner says the sonnets still express his opinion of the lunacy law from which he is freed besides having to suffer until they are reformed. His manuscript, the sonnets being inspired by a quotation from an interview with himself appearing in THE SUN, is as follows:

"THE SLEEPING BEAUTY"
HAIL AND FAREWELL.
When I left her twenty years ago, New York was like a little girl, a sweet girl of 14. She gave promise of beauty, but that's all. To-day, when I come back to her it is like a suddenly coming into the world of a twenty-year-old girl as a ravishing belle of 18. She's glorious.
I kiss my city's dear finger tips
And cry: "All hail Queen of the Western World!"
At which a smile doth curl her haughty lips—
Those lips that once were kissed by me—
I say: "All hail Fair Queen, Hail and farewell!"
"Is but a little while—and I am gone—
Like Cinderella time doth slip—
Like hers, mine eyes must rest the clock upon—
But I am thankful to have 'got this glimpse—
This vision sweet of thy majestic charm—
May my kiss be the last of my life—
That waked his sleeping Princess to breathe the air."

GEM DEALER ATTACKED.
Harry Badian, Beaten, Choroformed and Robbed Near Home.
Highwaymen, lurking in the court at the entrance to the apartment house at 205 West 103d street, attacked Harry Badian, a diamond merchant living at 203, as he passed on his way home early yesterday. After a struggle, in which he fought desperately, a cloth saturated with chloroform was slipped across his face and he dropped. He was then dragged into a nearby tenement house, where his clothing and jewelry were stripped from him and he was thrown into a room. He was then taken to a hospital.

INQUIRY INTO STATE HOSPITAL.
Woman Charges Brother Is Poorly Fed at Danmora.
The Prison Survey committee which is investigating alleged mistreatment of inmates at Clinton Prison, Danmora, heard the testimony of Mrs. Ernest Sofke, who charged that her brother, Ernest Sofke, had been poorly fed and brutally treated by the guards at the Danmora State Hospital. He has been confined there since May, 1918, following conviction for shooting his wife and attempting suicide in Rome, N. Y.

EX-ARMY CAPTAIN GETS THIRTY DAYS.
D. C. Flanagan "Beat" Bills at Pennsylvania.
Donald C. Flanagan, 30, formerly a Captain in the 34th Infantry, National Army, received a thirty day sentence to the workhouse from Justice Edwards, Kerochick, an attorney in General Sessions yesterday after he had pleaded guilty to being a hotel beat.

SWANN TRYING NOW TO EXTRADITE THAW.
Second "Visiting" Permit Leads to Criticism.
Because Harry K. Thaw has been permitted to leave the Pennsylvania Hospital for the insane near Philadelphia on a visit to his mother in Pittsburgh, District Attorney Edward Swann says he will make an effort to have Thaw returned to New York for trial on an indictment charging him with assaulting Frederick Gump, a Kansas City high school boy. Mr. Swann yesterday said he had ordered the filing of a requisition for Thaw and would try to extradite him.

FILM PLANT, STRUCK BY LIGHTNING, BURNS YONKERS PROPERTY LOSS IS QUARTER MILLION.
A bolt of lightning which struck the plant of the Unexcelled Film Laboratories and Studios at Yonkers at 3 o'clock last evening destroyed the three-story building, film and other property valued at \$250,000. The building was unable to learn whether a vault, in which it was said \$1,000,000 worth of newly made film was stored, was damaged.

ANNALS MARRIAGE TO BOGUS CAPTAIN.
Court Sets Free "Mrs. Clarence Stark."
After hearing the testimony of Loretta V. MacMahon, who is known as Mrs. Clarence Stark, and several corroborative witnesses, Justice Gieserich annulled yesterday the marriage she contracted with "Capt. Clarence Stark," who as plain Private Irour Peterson, now serving a twenty-five year term by the sentence of an army court-martial, appeared in Supreme Court but offered no objection to the proceedings. Peterson, who was in custody of a military guard, is serving the term imposed on him at Ft. Jay for impersonating an officer, desertion and contracting a bigamous marriage.

WIFE GETS NEW HAT, YET SHE COMPLAINS.

Twenty cents will not purchase a suitable hat for the wife of a man who earns \$2,000 a month.

REGINA D'ITALIA BRINGS 1,600 DOUGHBOYS EAGER TO BEAT DRY LAW.
A brown eyed and vivacious French girl who spoke English imperfectly, but fascinatingly, according to reports arriving yesterday by the Italian liner Regina d'Italia, made a gallant effort to marry most of the doughboys of the Thirty-ninth Division. She hooked eight by actual count, according to a soldier of the division, Private Elliott Brown of Atlanta, Ga., who came back with other comrades of that matrimonial command.

RECTOR SO POOR HE IS OWN CHAUFFEUR.
Former Restaurateur Puts Income Now at \$1,500.
George W. Rector, former restaurateur, whose name for many years was synonymous throughout America with gaily and high living, is now forced to take a motor car, of humble origin, and struggle along on a bare pittance of some \$1,500 a year, according to affidavits filed yesterday with Justice Hendrick in Supreme Court.


