Parcel Post Rules for Africa. Postmaster Patten announced yesterday that parcel post shipments to the Union of South Africa must be marked to show the true valuation of the articles enclosed at the current market prices of the packages will be liable to confiscation. Shipments of the following goods by parcel post are forbidden: Bullion, gold, platinum, precious stones, jewelry, eau de cologne, base metal, ivory, and other articles. Importers of firearms must present a permit from the Government of the Union of South Africa. Potatoes will be admitted only when accompanied by a sworn declaration of origin.

Major Broderick Promoted. The promotion of Major John Broderick to the rank of Lieutenant-Colonel in the Motor Transport Corps was announced yesterday. THEATRE MANAGERS MOBILIZE FOR WAR

Leaders in Every Amusement Branch Organize in Scrap With Actors.

STRIKE BROUGHT NEARER War to the End Now, Both Sides Declare as Peace Dove Vanishes.

War by both sides was declared yesterday by the actors and theatrical managers. After a week during which peace seemed imminent and the managers went so far as to recognize the Actors Equity Association to the extent of having conferences with it, the Producing Managers Protective Association suddenly exploded a bombshell yesterday by organizing itself into a far more powerful body that included besides the legitimate field vaudeville, burlesque, motion picture and virtually every form of theatrical amusement.

This was the managers' answer to the action of the players in affiliating themselves with the American Federation of Labor three weeks ago. At the same time the new managerial body, as yet unnamed, broke off relations with the Equity organization and declared its intention of treating with the actors individually, and not through their union. This step will be reported to the members of the A. E. A. at a special meeting which will be held this afternoon at 2 o'clock at the Hotel Astor, instead of yesterday. A strike of actors is the result predicted.

A new coalition of managers was effected at a meeting of nearly all the important producing managers in the city, at which Sam Harris, president of the Producing Managers Association, and Charles G. Grimes of Dayton, Ohio, formerly Miss Lucy Burleson, wife of Canada later this month to stay with her mother and sister.

"BIG 3" TO CONTROL CHAIN OF THEATRES

Erlanger Joins Dillingham and Ziegfeld in Combine.

The question of what combination of theatrical interests would be identified with Abraham L. Erlanger following his split with Marc Klaw was cleared up yesterday by the announcement that he has allied himself with Charles B. Dillingham and Florence Ziegfeld, Jr. They will control theatres jointly in the prominent cities, which are planned to be kept open fifty-two weeks in the year.

The new combination, which is looked upon as a dominating factor in the theatrical world, has a ten year lease of the Colonial, one of the leading Boston playhouses, as an initial move in its elaborate plans. A chain of new theatres expected to cost \$6,000,000 also is being planned for New York, Philadelphia, Chicago and other cities, all of these houses to be under the control of the big three.

Both dramatic and musical offerings will be presented. The alliance, it is announced, will in no way interfere with the individual productions of Messrs. Erlanger, Dillingham and Ziegfeld.
