

### SPECIAL 'RED' JURY GETS HURRY CALL

Adjournment to Sept. 2 Revoked and Sessions Will Be Resumed Wednesday.

### RUSSIAN RAID THE CAUSE

Evidence Against Milk Distributors May Be Presented for Action.

The special Grand Jury empaneled to consider cases of criminal anarchy and Justice Bartow S. Weeks, who was appointed by the Governor to sit at the extraordinary trial term of the Supreme Court called for the trial of these cases, will be recalled to resume this work Wednesday morning at 10 o'clock. The sessions were adjourned until September 2, when Assistant District Attorney Alexander I. Rorka, who is presenting evidence against anarchists and extreme radicals, most of which was gathered by the Law Legislative committee, investigating Bolshevism, informed the court that from ten days to a week would be required to get this matter into shape for proper presentation. As a result of the single session held by the grand jurors indictments against two alleged "Reds" were handed down to the court.

At the urgent request of District Attorney Swann William Penny, clerk of the court, telephoned Justice Weeks in Cape Vincent, N. Y., where the latter returned following the adjournment last week to resume his interrupted accuracy and received the order to reconvene the special inquisitorial body.

The reason given by Mr. Rorka for calling the Justice back from his vacation and for summoning the special grand jurors is that he wants to present direct to the Grand Jury the cases of the four alleged "Reds" held following the raid Thursday night at the Russian People's House, 133 East Fifteenth street. He does not want to expose the hands of the prosecution by having the evidence against these men presented in a police court.

### RENT CASES TO GO TO U. S. ATTORNEY

Relatives of Men in Service Charge Excessive Raises by Landlords.

### AGENTS PROTECT OWNERS

Refuse to Reveal Whereabouts of Two Sought, Despite Previous Pledge.

The Mayor's Committee on Rent Profiteering will turn over to the United States Attorney to-morrow a number of cases of alleged rent profiteering which come under the provisions of the soldiers' and sailors' civil relief act.

This will be done as a result of conferences held last week between Nathan Hirsch, chairman of the committee, and representatives of the Department of Justice, Walter S. Kennedy, Assistant Corporation Counsel, has the data on a number of cases of excessive rent raising charged by service men and will present it to the Federal Grand Jury. The cases to be investigated are:

Lieut. Arthur L. Vamedoe, a tenant of 3212 Broadway, Manhattan, which is under control of one, Jesse Sharp of Sharp & Co., real estate agents, with offices at Broadway and Ninety-ninth street. Sharp & Co. appeared before the committee, and while only agents of the premises, refused to divulge the whereabouts of Mr. Oppenbur of the Orton Holding Company, whom they admitted to be one of the officers of the company, which is the owner of the premises, and also to furnish the address of Harry McCullough, the principal stockholder in the said company, although they had promised to do so at a hearing held in the Municipal Building.

B. Wolfman, residing at 1012 Avenue J, Brooklyn, filed a complaint against Harry Wolfman of 1012 Avenue J, Brooklyn, claiming a violation of the Federal act. The tenant's son was in the army at the time the rent was raised and later was killed in France. The landlord in this case proposes a settlement.

Mrs. Meissner, 324 Fifty-first street, Brooklyn, presented a grievance against her landlord, James W. Kenny, who raised her rent \$6 while she was dependent upon two brothers in service in the United States army. Another brother, a member of the 27th Division, has just returned from overseas, but he is unable to obtain work. This case is pending settlement.

H. E. Purcell, attached to the United States navy, complained against Celia Morovitz, 71 West Twenty-third street, Manhattan, because of an increase of \$11 on his apartment at 218 Bradhurst avenue, The Bronx. It is proposed to settle this case on the basis of a return to the original rent and refunding the excess amount collected so far.

Anna O'Rourke, attached to the Cantons Service of the army, accuses Jacob Greinat, the treasurer of the Commonwealth Estate, Inc., a lessee of Joseph Sehenck, whose activities are under close scrutiny by the County Prosecutor. The premises involved are 2409 Broadway. The matter is still pending.

Mrs. Lennon, a widow, 510 East 134th street, The Bronx, pleaded a violation of the Federal act in that William H. Wiefelman of the A. W. W. Co., Inc., 273 East 198th street, The Bronx, had raised her rent \$7 notwithstanding the fact that the widow is dependent upon two sons now in the navy. This matter also is pending.

M. A. Lee, 2502 Eighth avenue, Manhattan, attached to the War Department, and claiming privilege under the Federal act, also complained of threatened distress and dispossession from his apartment while in the Government service. Mr. Lee has a wife and two children. This matter is being investigated.

Nehring Brothers, Inc., St. Nicholas building, at the court, of which Frederick Nehring is president, Paul Nehring vice president, and Charles Nehring secretary and treasurer, are accused of violation of the Federal act by William M. Trainor, father of four children, residing at 690 West 174th street. His rent had been raised \$9.50 while in military service, and his wife had been served with a dispossession notice on which she was obliged to go to court. This matter is pending.

A total of 743 cases were settled by the Rent Profiteering Committee last week in each of which concessions were made by the landlords in place of reducing the amount of the increase or granting yearly leases in place of the unsatisfactory month to month arrangement.

### Boston Probes Rent Increases.

BOSTON, Aug. 16.—Rent increases in apartment houses and office buildings are to be investigated by the State commission on the necessities of life. The commission has received many complaints, particularly from apartment house dwellers, and several investigators are now collecting data as to cost of construction, maintenance and tax increases. Upon receipt of their reports next week the commission plans to take up specific cases for investigation.

### Ban on Portuguese Meetings.

LISBON, Aug. 16.—The Cabinet has decided to prohibit all meetings, so that order may be maintained in Portugal. The Government now has under consideration a tentative commercial treaty with Spain.






