

\$41,000 BONDS AND MESSENGER FOUND

Missing Runner for Simmons & Slade Arrested at Saranac Lake.

COMRADE IS ALSO TAKEN

Trail of Broadway Chorus Girl Leads to Youth Who Fled August 12.

Two city detectives wired from Saranac Lake yesterday that they had captured Harry James Millhand, a \$15 a week messenger for whom they have been looking since August 13 for the theft of \$45,000 in Liberty bonds from Simmons & Slade of 5 Nassau street. With him, they arrested Arthur Eller, a companion, who is suspected of being an accomplice. They reported the recovery of \$41,000 of the bonds. The day Millhand disappeared Benjamin Binkowitz, a messenger for Richard Whitney & Co., also dropped out of sight. After Binkowitz failed to appear it was found that \$17,000 worth of bonds entrusted to him for delivery also had disappeared. The double theft set the detectives searching the city and private agencies were invoked to get some trace of the missing messengers and bonds. No connection was held to exist between the two thefts.

Detectives Mayer and Brown of the central office, assigned to the Simmons & Slade case, left the city about a week ago. It was rumored that they had obtained knowledge of the whereabouts of Millhand through a chorus girl. The girl left town and they followed.

The police investigation conducted in this city immediately after the theft established that it was "crazy over dancing" that led them to search the Broadway dance halls and cabarets. The trail from that point, as the message from Saranac Lake indicated, was plainly marked. The latest report received was that Detectives Mayer and Brown had put their two prisoners aboard a train for this city. They probably will arrive today.

The brokers, Simmons & Slade, were greatly surprised at Millhand's disappearance and the suspicion which attached to him over the loss of the bonds. The young man had offered excellent references when he applied for work as a messenger, they said, and what they had learned of his home life was admirable. Millhand is 21, and had been living with his sister at 157 West 127th street. Eller's connection with the case does not yet appear.

The clue to the search for Millhand was gleaned from the young man's sister, the police said. It was her statement that he was "crazy over dancing" that led them to search the Broadway dance halls and cabarets. The trail from that point, as the message from Saranac Lake indicated, was plainly marked. The latest report received was that Detectives Mayer and Brown had put their two prisoners aboard a train for this city. They probably will arrive today.

POLICE TESTIMONY SUFFICIENT FOR HIM

Magistrate McGeehan Attacks Judge McMahon.

Police testimony against women charged with soliciting is worthy of credence, and County Judge McMahon, who takes an opposite view of police veracity and who would have the city adopt segregation as a cure for soliciting, is anachronistic, according to Magistrate McGeehan.

The Magistrate issued his views from his office in the Women's court yesterday and declared that he knew whereof he spoke, because his experience in handling women's cases and listening to police testimony was much broader than Judge McMahon's.

After reading Judge McMahon's statement that he would hold nobody upon the uncorroborated testimony of policemen because they were interested in obtaining convictions for which they get credit marks—the path to promotion—the Magistrate said:

"It is the universal law of all countries that keep the streets clean that police testimony is held to be sufficient for the conviction of any person engaged in this branch of business."

Magistrate McGeehan quoted Dr. Abraham Flexner in support of his opposition to segregation, saying that "abolition as distinguished from regulation is the only effective mode of combating this age long evil."

"What does this Judge want?" demanded the Magistrate. "Does he want a group of women swindlers, badgers and blackmailers to be permitted the freedom of the streets of New York? I could hardly believe that a man who has had the early training and the education and of the religious belief that certain McMahon entertainers would advocate such a monstrous proposition. Any man advocating segregation will never endear himself to the people of this community or have a monument erected in his memory."

HONORS FOR DEAD OF "15TH."

Memorial Services Will Be Held in Brooklyn.

A memorial service for the brave dead of the "Old Fifteenth," the valiant 369th Infantry, will be held on Sunday, September 29, at the Bridge Street A. M. E. Church, Brooklyn, at 2 o'clock in the evening. It was announced yesterday by Sergeant Charles D. Davis, chairman of the committee on memorials for the regiment.

The memorial services will be held under the auspices of the George P. Davis Post No. 115 of the American Legion, the colored veterans' association in Brooklyn.

Col. William Hayward, in command of the regiment, will address the veterans, as will also Major John H. Clark of the same regiment. The memorial address will be delivered by the Rev. W. S. Carpenter.

All veterans of the world war, the Spanish-American war and the civil war, as well as members of the ladies' auxiliary of the post and fraternal organizations, are invited to partake in the ceremonies.

The committee on memorials for the services includes Sergeant Charles D. Davis, chairman; Sergeant John H. Thomas, vice-chairman; Sergeant A. L. Robinson, secretary; Sergeant Noah C. A. Walton, Sergeant Percy L. Crispin, Sergeant Eugene Faulkner and Sergeant William H. Jones.

Patrolman Wounded in Chase. Patrolman William R. Reimig of Traffic A was accidentally wounded by the discharge of his own revolver yesterday while chasing a motorist he had sighted driving on the wrong side of the street. The revolver fell from its holster and exploded on striking the pavement.
