Getting Ready for General Pershing.

As to Increasing Production.

The effect in metal manufacturing industries of the reduction of the working week to forty-eight hours

and to fifty hours is studied in a report published by the National Industrial Conference Board in Boston. In previous reports it was said that in the wool and the Northern cotton manufacturing industries the adoption of a fifty-four hour week generally resulted in decreased production.

In the metal manufacturing industries the report covered the metal trades proper, foundries and the manufacture of automobiles, hardware, electrical equipment and miscellaneous products.

The results presented in the report are based chiefly on the judgment of manufacturers, expressed in their replies to questionnaires sent out in 1917 and again in 1919.

Considered in connection with the present importance of increasing production, which was referred to by President WILSON in the letter addressed to the public last Monday, and with the movement to reduce the working week, in some cases to forty-eight hours, the statements made in this report and in other reports on the same question are of general interest.
