

ACQUINTANCE WITH THE ADIRONDACKS BEGINS

Beauties of Adirondacks to Be Filmed by Conservation Commissioner—Fliers at Lake Placid

LAKE PLACID, N. Y., Sept. 6.—The first attempt ever made to record by means of the movie camera the wonderful beauty of the Adirondack region is to be made by George D. Pratt, Conservation Commissioner, who, in addition to being a lover of the Adirondack region, is an enthusiastic and expert photographer. Under a new process film of sections of the Adirondacks, notably those in the vicinity of Lake Placid, will be made in the natural colors when the changes in the foliage, now beginning have reached their full beauty.

One view will show Wilmington Notch, which with the foliage changes is converted into a drive for miles beneath a canopy of gold and green. Other views will depict the St. Regis chain of lakes, where Commissioner Pratt's brothers, Henry and Fred M. Burger of New York and Glen Cove, has a camp on the Upper St. Regis; the Saranac chain of lakes; Elizabethtown and Keene Valley and scenes at Westport and other points on the shore of Lake Champlain.

Many who are still sojourning in the hotels and camps here gathered on Monday at the clubhouse of the Lake Placid Yacht Club for the annual Labor Day sports for guides and supervisors of the club. Flapjacks fried by the guides in the flapjack making contest served swimming in maple syrup.

Many sojourners at Lake Placid availed themselves this week of the opportunity to skip around among the mountain tops and view the region from the air in flights in the airplane piloted by Lewis C. Davies, who came over from Plattsburgh. Trips were made also in a flying boat with headquarters on Mirror Lake, and piloted by Lieut.-Commander J. P. Hall of New York.

Features of the celebration this week of the quarter century of the founding of the Lake Placid Club included the annual council fire and special Indian pageant, "The Pastors of the War Pole"; a Yuletide pageant of "The Light of Lanterns" on Mirror Lake, a concert in Forest of Arden Theatre and an address by the Rev. Charles H. Parkhurst, D. D.

The sum of \$100, cleared as a result of the annual costume ball at the Stevens House, was turned over to the Kings Daughters, who will be applied to the Lake Placid Children's Free Milk Fund. A. M.
