



White Sox Have Fine Record. Chicago also has never known a world's series loser in the American League.

Ed Williams's Home Run Record Made With Anson's Colts in 1884

While Babe Rube, the Boston Red Sox slugger, created a new home run record last week under the modern distance of the pitching slab, searches into the old files show that Ed Williams of the old Chicago Colts actually hit 27 home runs in 1884.

Ed while outfielding for Cap Anson's Chicago National League smote 27 home runs during the playing season of 1884.

The Colts in that year played on the old Congress street grounds, this handbox grounds being famous for its short 215 foot fence, on those grounds Ed smashed out 25 round trippers, banging his remaining pair on the Buffalo field.

Small as the Congress street diamond undoubtedly was, yet all championship contests engaged upon it were accepted as legal games, hence Williams's hits are entitled to the same recognition.

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M'KEAN'S SPLENDID BASEBALL CAREER

Ed had Life Batting Average of .300 and Fielding Figures of .900.

The recent death of Edward McKeon, a famous shortstop of two decades ago, marks the passing of one of the four big league shortstops who had a life's average batting of .300 or better.

Wonderful infielders and great batsmen were they. Perhaps McKeon was the hardest hitter of the four when it came to driving them out.

When the Cleveland club was transferred to St. Louis in 1899 McKeon went with them, and in that season ended his notable career in the uniform of the St. Louis Nationals.

Brilliant Fielder. Edward McKeon, besides being one of the best infielders who was a gentleman, had a life's average of .900 in fielding.

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Ty Cobb and Ed Roush Still Lead the Majors

Detroit Star and Cincinnati Speed Boy Retain the Batting Leadership of American and National Leagues—Cicotte and Sallee Top the Pitchers.

Ty Cobb of the Detroit Tigers added ten more points to his batting average last week, and practically clinched the American League championship.

Ed Roush of the Cincinnati Reds, who is his closest rival among American League regulars, Cobb has only a little more than two weeks to retain this lead.

In the National League Eddie Roush of Cincinnati still leads, but he has not yet clinched his honors.

Cobb also leads the American League in number of hits. He has had 126 games made by his team.

Roush also has cracked out the most hits in the National League. He has 119 singles.

Sallee of the White Sox and Cicotte of the Reds, the pitchers who may oppose each other in the opening game of the world's series, lead the major league twirlers.
