

Seizure of Fiume caused a crisis in the Italian Cabinet. Landing of our marines at Trau started a Senate inquiry here; Secretary Daniels didn't know of any order. Rear Admiral Philip Andrews, in direct command, got word from Rear Admiral Knapp and the latter followed the British Admiralty's plans—one of the neatest world messes yet seen.
