

POLITICIANS AGOG OVER KELLY MOVE

Much Speculation Over Effect of His Name Is Kept Off Ballot.

TO ARGUE MOTION TO-DAY

Major Declares Liberty Party Will Go On, Regardless of Court Ruling.

Political leaders of all camps were discussing with great interest yesterday the possibility that the name of Major Michael A. Kelly, candidate of the Liberty Party for President of the Board of Aldermen, would be taken off the ballot for lack of signatures.

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UNTERMYER BARS DRAFT INSPECTION

Stands on Statement Regarding Classification Action.

Irwin Untermyer, the 30-year-old son of Samuel Untermyer and the Tammany candidate for Justice of the Supreme Court, refused yesterday to authorize the Federal officials to permit an inspection of the records in his classification for the draft.

It was pointed out to Mr. Untermyer that the best way to answer the records before the appeal board, of which Charles E. Hughes was chairman, an offer was made to publish a photographic copy of the records.

Mr. Untermyer refused to say nothing more on the subject. He stands pat on the statement he made.

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Registrations by Fair Sex Fall Off 44,788 Over Previous Year.

RICHMOND REVEALS GAIN

Democrats Say Falling Off Was in Ranks of the Republicans.

Corrected registration figures with the men and women segregated, made public by the Board of Elections yesterday, show that the women failed to an extraordinary extent to qualify for the coming election and for the spring and next fall's primaries.

The total registration in the city was 44,105 greater than last year's tabulation shows that 43,788 fewer women registered than in 1918.

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O'MALLEY PUTS LID ON FUND IN BANKS

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

This new theatre, seating 5000 people, is the largest in the world.

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
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
