

BUTCHERS REFUSE NEW WAGE DEMAND

About 4,000 Meat Cutters and Drivers Out in Three City Boroughs.

PACKING PLANTS CLOSED

Employers Assert Many Men Will Return To-morrow—Strikers Count on Gain.

The New York and Brooklyn Meat Packers Association rejected yesterday the demands of the meat cutters, drivers and delicatessen salesmen who struck in Manhattan and Brooklyn Friday and thus drew the issue for a final fight. Nearly all of the larger packing plants, especially the Bologna concerns, were closed yesterday for lack of men, while smaller shops were not greatly affected and in instances, such as at the Washington Market, it was asserted that the strike was a failure.

Increases of from \$12 to \$15 during the last sixteen months. According to the proposed working agreement which they rejected yesterday called for a forty-eight hour week of eight hours a day, and that the men were willing to work on Labor Day, but not on May 1, but want double time for holidays.

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Action by members of the Milk Drivers Union, Local 584, who met in Arcadia Hall, Brooklyn, yesterday afternoon to vote on the acceptance or rejection of what the milk distributors of Greater New York declare are their final terms, was again deferred for a few hours. The New York Milk Conference Board, representing the distributors, said in a statement last night that it was informed a strike ballot is to be taken by the 8,000 union men at the expiration of that time.

The hearing before Federal Judge Augustus N. Hand on petition of Thomas O. Smith & Sons, wholesale milk distributors, to restrain Frederick J. Sterlinsky as president of the local and other officers from going on strike, was postponed until Friday following a pledge given to the Judge by the union attorney, William Karlin, that in case of strike there would be no violence to the Smith company's employees. The company is one of the few in this city not represented on the New York Milk Conference Board.

Postponement of balloting either to accept the offer of the board or to strike is regarded as a temporary victory for the conservative element in the union, radicals at the meeting being loud in their demands for a strike.

Many of the delegates attended the session in automobiles, the cars being parked in various streets near the meeting hall.

The contracts between the union and the milk board expired Friday night, the union men having submitted on October 1 their demands for a new one year contract to start yesterday, at \$50 per week and 2 per cent commission on collections. The Milk Conference Board declared that the final terms offered Friday night conceded the six day week, improved working conditions and a liberal increase in wages, emphasizing the fact, however, that the increased cost of milk distribution would be borne by the consumer.
