

POLICE THWART VIOLENCE HERE BY COMMUNISTS

Arrests Bare Anarchist Plot to Force Clash With Authorities.

RUTGERS SQUARE SCENE

Women and Children Told to Keep Away—50,000 Secret Circulars.

Plans for a mass meeting of Reds to have been held next Saturday in Rutgers square and at which violence was to have met any attempt at interference were set at naught by the police yesterday through the seizure of a mass of anarchist literature and the arrest of two men who are charged with printing and distributing it.

The literature consists of more than 50,000 circulars bearing the mark of the Communist Party of America and was seized when two secret printing establishments, one in Eldridge street and the other in Fifth street, were raided. The circulars were of three kinds. One announced the proposed mass meeting; another called upon all genuine Socialists in this country to take part in a revolution, and the third called upon them to boycott the coming elections. The men arrested are Maurice Neuman, of 170 Essex street and Benjamin Toback, of 102 East Fourth street.

The arrests and the seizure of propaganda were made by members of the Bomb Squad, headed by Detective Sergeant James J. Gegan, working under the direction of Deputy Commissioner William J. Lahey. There was seized also a mailing list containing more than 10,000 names which are thought to be those of anarchists. The list contains names of men located in cities all over the United States and Commissioner Lahey regards it as the most valuable piece of paper which has come into his possession in many a day.

Neuman and Toback are being held on charges of criminal anarchy. They were wary when questioned after their arrest, but let slip certain bits of information which caused the members of the raiding party to congratulate themselves on having made the raid and arrests before the projected mass meeting next Saturday.

Harred Women and Children.

One thing they gleaned was that those invited to Rutgers square had been cautioned not to bring women or children with them. Another was that during the meeting pickets were to watch the progress from the roofs of buildings facing the square. The police said yesterday that they had no doubt but that "anarchist apples," or small hand bombs, would have been thrown from the roofs had the meeting taken place and the police attempted to break it up. They consider that the warning against women and children being brought to the meeting was in anticipation of a clash between the Reds and the police.

The handbills of invitation to the meeting stated that it would be held in celebration of the second anniversary of the Bolshevik revolution in Russia. The bills invited "workmen and comrades" to "come in thousands and strike on November 2."

The propagandist circulars inviting all good Socialists to take part in a revolution were headed, "A Challenge," and explained that "now that we have a real revolutionary party, a duty falls upon us—action. Since the reign of the Russian Government was ended at the hands of the Bolsheviks, a commotion for revolutionary Socialism began to take place all over the world, and in America more than anywhere else, this commotion took on an organized form. Our programme is as revolutionary as can be. We are working day and night to bring about a revolutionary programme in this land of ours, but we alone can not do the work. Remember, comrades, that our leaders do not want merely a verbal answer from you. They want action. They want you to understand that this is not the moment to shrink. You must devote lots of your time and energy to the achievement of our purpose, which is an establishment of a dictatorship of the proletariat."

Challenge by "Left Wing."
The "challenge," like all the other literature seized, bears the imprint of the

Communist party of America, which describes itself as the left wing of the Socialist party and which broke away from the mild or orderly Socialists last year when it tried to get them to endorse its extreme notions and could not.

The circulars seized yesterday, asking all Communist party members to unite in a boycott of the polls on election day, reveal perhaps that the leaders of the "left wing" have not the enthusiastic following which they proclaim themselves as having, for it is a palpable attempt to shrink the vote percentages of regular Socialist candidates by inducing Socialist voters not to vote at all. It contains these among other arguments: "Can you vote for Meyer London, pro-war patriot? Or Zabin, Milwaukee's Socialist District Attorney, who railroaded Socialists to jail? Or the Socialist aldermen who voted Liberty bonds and victory arches? These Aldermen have all been renominated by their party.

"Workers, do not be deceived by the miserable slogans of the deceivers of the proletariat. Do you expect anything of Socialist party job holders and their hirelings? Vote on election day? Cheap rent, cheap milk, cheap fares, cheap fairy tales and cheap promises—can the job seekers fulfill them?"

"Workers, the United States seems to be on the verge of a revolutionary crisis, and the workers through their strikes are challenging the capitalistic State. The Communist party task is to unify these strikes, aiming at the very overthrow of the capitalist State itself. Out of these mass industrial struggles must issue the means and the inspiration for the conquest of power by the workers. Boycott the elections."

PLOT AGAINST I. R. T. TO BE INVESTIGATED

Reports of Scheme to Force System in Bankruptcy Arouse Grand Jury.

Reports that certain officials and others have been engaged in a conspiracy to discredit the Interborough Rapid Transit Company to the end that it might be forced into bankruptcy so that the operation of its lines would have to be undertaken by the city are to be investigated by the extraordinary Grand Jury when it reconvenes tomorrow, according to unofficial statements in circulation yesterday at the Criminal Court Building.

The charge in question is said to be the "crime of overshadowing importance" mentioned in connection with the proceedings of the Grand Jury which was summoned to probe into Mayor Hylan's accusation that Interborough officials and those of its employees' brotherhood had instigated the transit strike here last August as part of a plot to get higher fares.

The proposed investigation, it is now said, was the subject of discussion at the several secret meetings held by the Grand Jury Friday both in the Grand Jury and the Supreme Court room. District Attorney Swann was said to have been asked informally if he would consent to waive immunity and appear as a witness at a John Doe hearing.

The Grand Jury, it is understood, is planning action to-morrow under the provisions of section 260 of the Code of Criminal Procedure, which provides that it is the "imperative duty of the Grand Jury to inquire into the willful and corrupt misconduct in office of officers of every description in the county," and that "in pursuance of this inquiry," the Grand Jury is "entitled to free access to the examination of all public records in the county."

It became known yesterday that in connection with the expected inquiry subpoenas have been issued for a number of witnesses, among whom are believed to be several members of Mayor Hylan's official family. It is also reported that the Grand Jury has requested the production before it of papers in possession of city officials relating to the walkout of Interborough employees last August. Some of the papers are said to be on file in the Mayor's office.

District Attorney Swann was out of town for the week end yesterday and Alfred J. Talley, who was acting District Attorney, declined to say whether subpoenas had been issued by his office in behalf of the Grand Jury.

Mr. Swann, it was said, has not taken the attitude of refusing to appear as a witness or of declining to sign a waiver of immunity in any investigation which the special Grand Jury may properly conduct. His reported refusal Friday was explained as being due to an objection on his part to answer questions by members of the Grand Jury as individuals or while that body was meeting informally and not sitting as a Grand Jury.

Baker Lays Cornerstone.
POTTSTOWN, Pa., Nov. 1.—Newton D. Baker, Secretary of War, to-day laid the cornerstone of a memorial hall at the Hill School here for students killed in the war. The building dedicated will be an auditorium and library, with rooms for literary work.
