

REPUBLICANS CARRY KINGS; HASKELL WINS

Wet Candidate for County Judge Carries Colleague into Office.

LA GUARDIA FAR AHEAD District Attorney Lewis Is Re-elected—Rest of Ticket in Close Race.

Indications at midnight were that the Republican ticket had won an impressive victory in Kings county. Reuben L. Haskell, the Republican anti-prohibition candidate for County Judge, polled a smashing vote, carrying his colleague, County Judge Norman S. Dike, to victory with him. Haskell's plurality, based upon early figures, was estimated to be about 70,000. Dike's vote was not far behind Haskell's. Incomplete returns showed that Haskell's vote was almost equal to the combined vote of his two Democratic opponents. In 325 of 350 election districts Haskell polled 59,696 votes. Dike, Daniel J. Griffin, Democrat, 34,405, and Howard P. Nash, Democrat, 32,713.

"Brooklyn," said Mr. Haskell as the returns indicated his election, "is the most independent voting sector of the United States, and it has indicated in the most emphatic way its attitude for the future. It should again be amended to provide a direct vote on prohibition."

"And, further, that all amendments proposed heretofore designed to restrict the personal liberties of citizens, as the prohibition of tobacco, tea, coffee, etc., shall be submitted to a nationwide referendum vote."

Those who deliberately tried to misrepresent and spread the great principles for which this fight was conducted have properly been rebuked and repudiated for their studied and practiced deception amounting to an attempt to defraud the public."

Dry Leader Fought Haskell. The fight of Representative Haskell against all the other contents in Brooklyn because of its spectacular features. When early in the summer he expressed a desire to receive the indorsement of the Republican organization for the county judge nomination, the Anti-Saloon League served notice on the organization that it would defeat the ticket if Haskell were indorsed. This was because he had introduced in Congress a resolution for a referendum on prohibition. Haskell was referred to Frederick C. Murphy on the matter of candidates recommended in the primaries. Refusing to accept this verdict, the Representative in a hot fight defeated Murphy and gained the nomination on.

William H. Anderson, State Superintendent of the Anti-Saloon League, waged constant warfare against Haskell after the primaries, spending money without stint for the distribution of circulars and advertising. Because of the interest in the campaign Haskell was in great demand at all meetings and it was concluded that Haskell would lose about ten per cent. of the Republican vote, that connected with the churches. On the other hand, the Democrats supported Haskell openly and some of the leaders were working for him secretly.

John H. McCooey conceded the defeat of his judicial candidates at 11 o'clock last night at the Madison Club. He still seemed to think that the rest of the Democratic Kings County candidates would win. He refused to give his opinion on the reasons for the Democratic slump. Other leaders said that it was due to national issues such as prohibition, the high cost of living and labor troubles.

Squires Leads Dowling. With about half of the election returns from L. Squires, Republican candidate for the Supreme Court, was leading George J. S. Dowling, Democrat, by over 5,000, and the indications were that he would carry Kings county. Although Dowling was an independent and wanted the Supreme Court nomination from John J. Kuhn, the organization candidate in the primaries, the indications were that the "regulars" had given him their full support.

F. H. La Guardia, candidate for President of the Board of Aldermen, beat Robert L. Moran, Democrat, by 12,000, the very first, and with almost all the 954 districts in was leading by a safe margin of about 20,000.

District Attorney Harry E. Lewis, Republican, who went to the mat in a hot campaign with John B. Johnston, Democrat, has apparently been re-elected by a plurality of 10,000. The returns for the rest of the county ticket were meagre and indicated that the race was a close one. On this the Democratic organization planned its hopes. In 150 election districts George A. Wingate, Democrat, was leading James C. McLeer, Republican, by 800. John Drecher, Republican, was slightly ahead of James J. Brown, Democrat, for Sheriff. William E. Kelly, Democrat, won the fight for County Clerk by about 5,000. Maddox and Webster were in a close race for Register.

William H. Anderson, State Superintendent of the New York Anti-Saloon League, was informed at his home in

Yonkers last night of the election of Mr. Haskell. "Mr. Haskell is elected," said Mr. Anderson. "In view of the number of independent Democratic votes he received, it is very evident that practically all of the decent, patriotic, moral element of the Republican party must have cut him and he is entitled to all of the satisfaction he can get from such a victory."

"There is no happy prospect, there is no happy future, for Haskell or for any other man who is in office by assailing a moral principle. While he may be elected, we must realize that this time he has deceived the good, law-abiding element, or at least a portion of it."

G. O. P. HAS NET GAIN OF SIX IN ASSEMBLY

Tammany's Interference With Judiciary Proves Costly to Democrats.

Now Get Only 48 Seats Largest Republican Victory Is in Kings—Miss Lilly Defeated by Noel Fox.

The Republican swing in New York city, set in motion by the Tammany interference with the judiciary, has cost the Democrats the fruits of their gains in the State Assembly districts, gains for the most part due to local conditions. The Republicans show a net gain of six seats, giving them a round membership of 100 in the lower house of the Legislature. They gained ten seats in the city, while the Democrats gained five and lost one up State. The Socialist representation stands at two, as where one Socialist was elected in the Fourth and Bronx district another was defeated in the Seventeenth Manhattan. The lower house will thus stand: Republicans, 100; Democrats, 48; Socialists, 2.

The biggest Republican gain came from Kings county. There Harry Dimin beat Martin Solomon, the present Democratic Assemblyman, with apparently a falling off in the Socialist vote. In the Tenth district Leo Doherty, Republican, beat Hoxie Smith, the present Democrat. In the Eleventh, the present Democrat, beat the present Democratic incumbent in the Eleventh, as did W. T. Simpson in the Twelfth. In the Eighteenth and Twenty-second, the Socialists and George H. Forbell beat Democratic candidates. Mrs. Mary B. Lilly, the Democratic Assembly member from the Seventh New York district, was beaten by Noel F. Fox, a Republican, Martin Bourke, in the Ninth, and William C. Amos in the Eleventh, also turned Democratic districts Republican.

Democratic Hold Broken Except in Isolated Cases. The Democratic hold on up-State New York cities, which was gained in most cases in the last Presidential election, was broken yesterday. The administrations of Syracuse and Utica were made Republican by good majorities. In Birmingham a Republican Mayor was elected, and in White Plains elected Frederick E. Weeks Mayor over the Democratic incumbent, Farrington M. Thompson, by a sound majority. George R. Linn, a Democrat, retained the strong popularity he has built up in Schenectady and won the Mayor's office.

BINGHAMTON, Nov. 4.—Wilson, Republican, was elected Mayor over Seymour, Democrat.

WHITE PLAINS, Nov. 4.—The Republicans swept White Plains to-day and also elected a woman as Councilman at Large. Frederick E. Weeks was elected Mayor by 1,050 votes defeating the Democratic incumbent, Farrington M. Thompson. Weeks polled 3,173 votes and Thompson 2,123.

FRANK M. WILSON, Mrs. Belle Marion Knight and Charles Everett Moore were elected Councilmen at Large. Three Republican Supervisors also were elected.

MOUNT VERNON, Nov. 4.—Republicans were generally successful in tonight's voting, although two Democrats were chosen. For Mayor, Elmer L. Kincaid, Republican, defeated Albert F. Deahed by 1,214. George C. Appell, a Democrat, was re-elected City Judge over Frederick W. Clark. The Rev. James Berg, Republican, was re-elected Comptroller over Abel J. Levine, a war veteran and Democrat. For City Treasurer Mrs. Emma L. Hollywood, Republican, defeated R. J. Flynn. For Receiver of Taxes John H. Cordes, Democrat, won over George E. Weatherly, For Assessor John Mackenzie, Republican, defeated John S. Lyons.

He ran independently and took only 141 votes. George Warner, chairman of the Board of Supervisors of West Chester, was re-elected by a plurality of 1,353.

EDWARD TOWN, Nov. 4.—Democratic candidate for Town Clerk, who fought in the big war and lost a leg at Verdun, was defeated by about 500 votes by Charles O. Derby, who was re-elected for a third term.

HARRISON, Nov. 4.—The Democratic candidate for Tax Receiver, defeated David Barnes, Republican, by 393 votes.

ELMIRA, Nov. 4.—The election of George W. Peck, Democrat, for Mayor over W. I. Booth, Republican, by 500 is conceded by the Republican committee.

GENEVA, Nov. 4.—George S. Stubbs, Republican, was re-elected Mayor to-day over Dr. C. C. Lytle, Democrat, by a majority of 63.

ITHACA, Nov. 4.—Edwin C. Stewart, Republican, was elected Mayor of Ithaca to-day.

NIAGARA FALLS, Nov. 4.—Maxwell W. Thompson, Republican, was elected Mayor to-day.

MAINA, Nov. 4.—Gerald B. Fluhrer, named by Gov. Smith to fill a vacancy of County Judge of Orleans County, was defeated to-day for election. He carried the entire Democratic County ticket down with him and after January 1 Orleans County will be without a Democratic county official for the first time in twenty years. The unpopularity of the Governor's appointment of Mr. Fluhrer is said by Democrats to be largely responsible for the result.

HONOLULU, Nov. 4.—Fred A. Robbins, Republican, was elected Mayor of Honolulu to-day by a plurality of 1,332, the largest ever given a majority candidate here. The entire Republican city ticket was elected.

PORT JERVIS, Nov. 4.—May F. R. Grant Thorpe, People's party, was defeated by George Hornebeck, Fusion, by a vote of 1,470 to 401. The entire Fusion ticket won by a large majority.
