

**ARMY CUTS PRICES ON BEEF AND PORK**

**Sales of More Frozen Chickens Also Will Be Made to New York People.**

Uncle Sam is doing his level best to provide New Yorkers with a big supply of surplus army and navy foodstuffs at prices about which nobody can complain except dealers who would like to enjoy a monopoly of retailing the same sorts of foodstuffs at unpopular war time prices.

Col. J. M. Carson, zone supply officer, announced yesterday the army has reduced its price for frozen beef from 15 cents a pound to 12 cents a pound. There are 1,000,000 pounds of army beef in metropolitan freezers, besides 1,000,000 pounds more

In Chicago that could be brought to this city if the people here want it. Col. Carson said also that the Government's price for frozen pork shoulders has been fixed at 17 1/2 cents a drop from 22 cents, which promises to be attractive to retail butchers.

Thus far 800,000 pounds of frozen chicken have been sold in the greater city and dealers have obligated themselves to take 600,000 pounds more.

Charles W. Grismer, president of the National Retail Butchers Association, expressed the opinion last night that frozen beef at 12 cents might be popular with hotels and restaurants, but he did not think it would make much of a hit with the average retail butchers, although they might be induced to handle it if they could get it from the Government at 10 cents a pound.

Uncle Sam opened yesterday in the Second Field Artillery Armory, 166th street and Franklin avenue, The Bronx, his second emporium for the retail sale of army surplus food and dry goods. The store was stocked with \$500,000 worth of goods, and would be customers began to gather at the armory two hours and a half before the doors were opened. Almost 2,000 people were jammed in the

street at 10 o'clock, the hour scheduled for beginning business, and Capt. G. W. Smith, Q. M. C., asked Capt. John Landry of the Morrisania police station to send around some cops to establish order. Sales got under way half an hour later, but only fifty persons were permitted in the store at a time. The sales will be conducted until further notice from 10 A. M. until 5 P. M., except Sundays. Capt. Smith said it is possible to get \$2,000,000 worth of food and merchandise for this particular store.

The first "emporium," at 22 West Nineteenth street, continues to do a rushing business.

The distribution of navy surplus foodstuffs is being pushed by the city for the Government through the Department of Public Markets. Sales are being made at food stations established by the Rev. Dr. Jonathan C. Day, Commissioner.

These stations are now in operation: Manhattan—Jefferson Market, Eighth street and Sixth avenue; Queensboro Market, Fifty-ninth street and First avenue. Brooklyn—Twenty-third Regiment Armory, Bedford avenue and Pacific street; Fourteenth Regiment Armory, Eighth avenue and Fifteenth street. The Bronx—Eighty Coast Artillery Armory,

Jerome avenue and Kingsbridge road, Richmond—Red Cross Building, St. George, Staten Island.

Additional stations are to be opened as follows: Old armory building, 177th street and Bathgate avenue, The Bronx, which has been turned over to Dr. Day for market purposes free of charge by the owner, the American Bank Note Company; public building at Birch street and Atlantic avenue, Richmond Hill, permission to use which has been granted by the Sinking Fund Commission, and a building owned by the New York and Queens Electric Light and Power Company, Jackson avenue at the Bridge Plaza, Long Island City.

The "navy food markets" take the place of the public school stores, all of which have been closed.

Peter H. Alnor, president of the New York Retail Grocers Association, said last night that all retail grocers now are getting about 75 per cent. of their required sugar supplies. The breaking up of the sugar shortage has arrived, he said, but it still is necessary that there be economy in the use of sugar. He believes that consumers will be able to get their full sugar supplies next week.

Arthur Williams, Federal Food Ad-

ministrator, expressed the hope that with the approach of normal conditions in the sugar market people who paid exorbitant prices for sugar during the shortage will give him information that may aid in bringing sugar profiteers to justice. He declared that unpatriotic men who violate Food Administration regulations ought not to be protected by anybody.


