

DOUBLE FARE WILL HAVE COURT TEST

Brooklyn City Road to Resume Collections of Extra Nickels.

RECEIPTS TO PASSENGERS

Line's Manager Denies Jurisdiction of Public Service Commission.

To the end that a judicial settlement of the right of the Brooklyn City Railroad Company to charge an extra 5 cent fare on its Flatbush avenue line beyond Foster avenue may be made, the commission intends deliberately to disobey the order of the Public Service Commission forbidding such double collection.

Beginning to-morrow the extra charge, which was stopped for a few days because of the riots, will be resumed; each passenger will receive a receipt for his second nickel, which will be refunded if the courts decide that it was wrongfully collected.

H. Hart Porter, general manager of the Brooklyn City, had this to say last night:

"The Public Service Commission was created primarily to regulate the operation of public utilities, and it was not contemplated that it should displace the courts in determining questions of law."

"The question of the company's rights to collect a second fare on Flatbush avenue is solely one of law, and as such can be finally determined only by the courts. The commission having decided that the company was not within its rights in collecting this second fare, there are two methods by which the issue may be brought before the courts:

"First, by certiorari, involving review by the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court of the decision of the Public Service Commission; second, by summary proceedings brought by the commission to enforce obedience of the order, if the same is not obeyed. The former method entails a long drawn out controversy; the latter assures a speedy determination of the legal questions. An agreement has been reached between the counsel for the company and counsel for the Public Service Commission to submit the question to the courts within a few days by this second method.

"By issuing rebate tickets, redeemable for 5 cents, the company provides a means by which the public is protected from any ultimate loss if the courts decide adversely to the company's contention."

"DAY OF SORROW" IS OBSERVED BY JEWS

Parade and Exercises To-day for Massacred in Ukraine.

A "Day of Sorrow" will be observed to-day by the Jews of the United States, a day of lament over the massacre of more than 100,000 Jews in Ukraine alone. In this city, Jewish war veterans will parade under the command of Col. Maurice Simmons. The column, starting at Rutgers street and marching through the center of the city to Carnegie Hall, will include divisions of Jewish veterans of the civil war, riding in motor cars; divisions of Jewish soldiers of the great war, veterans of the Spanish-American war and other divisions made up of Jews that have served in Army or Navy. Three service flags will be carried in the parade, one of 5,000 gold stars, for the American Jews who were killed fighting against Germany, one of 15,000 silver stars for the American Jews that were wounded, and one of 500,000 blue stars for the Jews that fought for democracy.

LEGION TO LOCATE AT INDIANAPOLIS

Headquarters Will Be Operated in That City.

Franklin D'Olier, newly elected national commander of the American Legion, announced yesterday that on December 1 national headquarters of the legion will be located in Indianapolis in accordance with the decision of the recent constitutional convention and will operate in that city thereafter. Lemuel Bolles, national adjutant, and Charles F. Sheridan, who will remain in charge of the service bureau for legion members and those eligible to membership, will go to-day to Indianapolis to make arrangements for offices and housing of the headquarters personnel.

Since November 10, the opening day of the Minneapolis convention, 225 additional posts of the American Legion have been chartered by the temporary national headquarters at 19 West Forty-fourth street. This brings the total number of legion posts in the United States and elsewhere to 4,872. The number of former soldiers, sailors and marines enrolled in the organization is now almost 1,250,000 and the total number of paid up members is over 750,000.

LANDLORDS 10 P. C. "PIRATES."

And That Minority Has Done Much Harm, Says Hirsch.

"That the housing situation in New York is 'almost unbelievable except by those who have felt the iron grip of the landlord,' is an assertion made by Nathan Hirsch, chairman of the Mayor's Committee on taxation, mortgage loans and rent profiteering. The committee finds that only 10 per cent. of the landlords are profiteers, but that the 10 per cent. did an enormous amount of harm and have done more to create unrest than any other agency.

Credit is given to the Republican Legislature for laws governing tax sales in Nassau and Suffolk counties for the protection of property owners, and for laws completely putting out of business fraudulent operators in suburban lots. The committee claims to have retrieved for defrauded owners 3,500 lots in Nassau and Suffolk counties that had been sold for negligible taxes.

Chairman Hirsch thanks the newspapers for the aid given in uncovering fraud and achieving reforms. The investigation of rent profiteering and tax sharks is still going on.
