

HUNTER COLLECTION IS PLACED ON VIEW

Includes Oriental Art, Anglo-American China and Early Glass.

IN REMARKABLE GROUPS

Snuff Bottles, Mirror Knobs and Porcelains of Particular Interest.

The American Art Association begins the new year with an exhibition of the important collection of the late Frederick W. Hunter, which includes Oriental art, Anglo-American china and early American glass.

Mr. Hunter spent a great many years in hunting his collection together, being a born collector, indefatigable in the effort to secure better and better examples.

The Chinese porcelains, while not particularly numerous, yet thoroughly represent the skill of the Far Eastern potter.

The snuff bottles are made of rare materials with rare workmanship and are on a par with the sword guards, carved ivory and lacquers for which the Orient is famous.

The Anglo-American Staffordshire plates interested Mr. Hunter very much, and his collection of "blue and white" is extensive, and replete with rare specimens.

Among the platters there are the "View of Castle Garden," with its "shell border," by Enoch Wood; the "Arms of Delaware," the "View of Weehawk," by Stevenson; the "View of New Jersey," by Mayer, and the "View of Fairmount," by Stubbs.
