

JAMES McLEAN, 76, MINE HEAD, DIES

President of Phelps-Dodge Was Officer and Director in Many Railroads.

James McLean, president of the Phelps Dodge Mercantile Company, 99 Fifth street, and an officer and director in many railroads and mining enterprises, died yesterday in his home, 907 Fifth avenue. He was in his seventy-ninth year. Mr. McLean was interested in the formation of Phelps, Dodge & Co. as a young man, and was a director in that corporation until his death. He was a director and member of the executive committee of the El Paso and Southern Railroad and its subsidiaries, director of the National Bleucht Company, the Old Dominion Company, the United Globe Mines and a director and member of the executive committee of the Lehigh Valley Railroad.

training with a New York outfit for the front, when Gen. Lee surrendered in 1865. Soon afterward Mr. McLean entered the firm of White & Haskell, then retained metal brokers in this city. He remained in that connection until 1874 when he was sent to Chicago by Phelps, Dodge & Co. Mr. McLean had a lively interest in sports and in art and science. He was for two years president of the National Home Show Association, a member of the Metropolitan Museum of Art, the Zoological Society and a number of clubs, including the Piping Rock, Metropolitan, Riding, Sleepy Hollow, Church and Race. He was a life member of St. Andrew's Society and a member of the American Institute of Mining Engineers. His religious interests were centered in the Church of the Incarnation and the Cathedral of St. John the Divine. He was a member of the cathedral board of trustees.

He leaves a widow, Mrs. Sara (Throckmorton) McLean, and three daughters, Mrs. H. V. Vavencroft of England, Miss Ethel L. McLean and Mrs. Alice McLean.

SIR EDMUND BARTON.

LONDON, Jan. 7.—Sir Edmund Barton, former Premier of Australia, who led the fight in London in 1909 which led to the formation of the Commonwealth of Australia, died in Sydney, New South Wales, on Sunday, according to advices received to-day.

Sir Edmund Barton was born at Glebe, Sydney, January 15, 1849, and was educated in Australia. He became Speaker of the New South Wales Legislative Assembly in 1883, and from that time was one of the strongest political leaders in the country. He was sent as a delegate to the Federal conventions which were held over a period of years preceding the direct demand upon the British Government for an independent administration. It was under his leadership that the scheme of government was prepared which was the subject of Parliament, and he was in London to see his mission accomplished after the Commonwealth bill had been presented.

He became Prime Minister and Minister for External Affairs in the first Australian Federal Cabinet. In 1903 he was appointed Senior Judge of the High Court of Australia, and following this appointment received many honors from Great Britain. He was made a member of Bencher's Gray Inn in 1902 and was awarded honorary degrees from the leading universities. His elevation to the peerage was in 1902. The Japanese Government made him a member of the Order of the Rising Sun a year later.

HOWARD PRICE RENSNAW.

Howard Price Renshaw of Great Neck, L. I., son of Alfred H. Renshaw, millionaire manufacturer of Troy, died yesterday in this city in his thirty-fourth year. His wife, who was Miss Lilla B. Gilbert, daughter of the late H. Bramhall Gilbert, becomes one of the wealthiest widows in the country. She inherited \$15,000,000 from the estate of her father, it was reported. Her mother married Major Cyril Patrick William Francis Radclyffe Dugmore of the British Army Service Corps in 1914.

Mr. Renshaw was a grandson of the late Commodore Cleveo Price, and a nephew of Mrs. Lily Hamersley, who became the Duchess of Marlborough. He married Miss Gilbert in 1913, after a romance which began at Palm Beach, Fla. He was an enthusiastic sportsman and an automobile enthusiast. He was a member of the Union, St. Nicholas, National Arts, Turf and Field and Columbia Graduate clubs.

EDGAR A. SHIELDS.

Edgar A. Shields, aged 57, for thirty-five years head of the advertising department of the World, died yesterday in his home, 433 St. Nicholas avenue, from pneumonia. He was taken ill Sunday. He leaves his wife and a son, Harold E. The funeral will be held Saturday from the residence, with interment in Flushing.

EDWIN FREDERICK HOWELL.

Funeral services will be held to-night for Edwin Frederick Howell, originator of the Land Bank of the State of New York, who died on Tuesday night of apoplexy. He was 65 years old and lived at 9 Arlington place, Brooklyn. Mr. Howell was born at Carboneer, N. E., and came to New York city as a telegrapher for the Western Union Telegraph Company. He was for thirty-five years chief operator of the Western Union.

Mr. Howell was a director of the Land Bank of the State and was formerly president of the State League of Building and Loan Associations. He was at one time first vice president of the United States League of Building and Loan Associations.

THE REV. HENRY W. EKLUND.

The Rev. Henry Werner Eklund, widely known as a minister of the Swedish Methodist Episcopal Church, died on Tuesday of apoplexy, at his home, 224 Troy avenue, Brooklyn. He was 71 years old and the author of more than two hundred hymns sung in the Swedish Methodist Episcopal Church here and abroad. Mr. Eklund was born in Sweden and came to the United States in 1859. He studied at the Swedish Theological Seminary at Uppsala, Ill., and also at Knox College, Galesburg, Ill. He served in churches throughout the United States and was twice district superintendent for Brooklyn of the Eastern Swedish Methodist Episcopal Church Conference. Funeral services will be held on Saturday afternoon at Immanuel Swedish Methodist Episcopal Church on Dean street, Brooklyn. Mr. Eklund is survived by his wife, two daughters and a son. Interment will be in Evergreen Cemetery.

HENRY M. CAMPBELL.

SOUTHBRIDGE, Conn., Jan. 7.—Henry M. Campbell, aged 79, archeologist, diplomat and linguist, died yesterday at his home here from injuries received when he was thrown from his carriage. He had been retired for several years. He was educated in Europe and was appointed Consul-General at Athens, Greece, by President Lincoln in 1862. He was imprisoned and narrowly escaped death on a charge of having knowledge of a plot to overthrow the Government. Campbell, who spoke five modern languages, served in the French espionage service during the Second Empire.

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Col. John M. Foster, civil war veteran and member of the Loyal Legion, died Tuesday at the Marie Antoinette Hotel, Broadway and Sixty-seventh street. Two years ago he resigned as president of the Foster Engineering Company of Newark, which he organized. He was born at Springfield, Ohio, in 1846, and was 14 when he enlisted with the Forty-fourth Ohio Infantry. He served through the civil war under Gen. Burnside in Tennessee, in the Shenandoah campaign with Gen. Sheridan and in many other campaigns, being wounded several times. In February, 1865, he was retired from the service for disability. In recognition of his war service he was invested in 1893 by special act of the Ohio State Legislature as Lieutenant-Colonel.

Co. Foster leaves his wife, Mrs. Towney Foster, members of the Loyal Legion and the Ohio Society will attend the funeral to-morrow.

MRS. A. I. DU PONT, ON WAY TO FLORIDA, DIES

She was taken ill while on her way to Florida and was removed from the train to a hospital. Mr. Du Pont, who was on his way to California, was notified of his wife's death.

Mrs. Du Pont was the daughter of former Judge Edward G. Bradford. She was a member of the Du Pont family, her husband being a cousin. She was married twice. Her first husband was George Amory Maddox, an employee of the Du Pont company. She divorced him. Mr. Du Pont and the former Mrs. Maddox were married in New York after he had obtained a divorce from the former Miss Besse Gardner of Philadelphia.
