MURDER IN LAWRENCE COUNTY.

A MURDER of the most horrible and revolting character is supposed to have perpetrated in Mahoning Township, about one mile from Edinburg, on the road to Mount Jackson, on Friday last. The circumstances and facts connected with it, as we have them from good authority, are as follows:

Our readers will remember that in November last a man was found in a hole in a wall, in a terrible state of destitution and suffering, and taken charge of by the overseers of the poor of the township. His name is John Brown, and he stated at that time that he had a wife when he went into the army, and on his return from the army found her married to another man named Frederick Carpenter. On ascertaining this fact, and that they were determined to live together, he left, and having no place to go, and no money, came to town, and had laid around the haystacks for three or four days, so that when found he was much emaciated, and his feet badly frozen. He was attended by Dr. Barker, and after about six months so far recovered that he could leave. He then went to where his wife and Carpenter lived, in a shanty in the place mentioned above, and since that time he and his son, and the woman and Carpenter, have lived together.

On Sunday last Carpenter died, and on Monday Coroner Barker held an inquest, when the following facts were elicited, Brown and his son being two of the witnesses. Mrs. Brown was married to Carpenter in Pulaski, according to the testimony of her son, about two years ago. They lived pleasantly together until his father came back, and he since had frequent quarrels, because Brown threatened them with prosecution. In these quarrels she always abused, beat, and kicked him, and on the Friday before his death Brown had again threatened to prosecute, when she kicked Carpenter, and told him not to "sit there like a damned fool, and let Brown strike him." She kicked him frequently, and always aimed to kick him in the most sensitive part of his body. The old man Brown stated that Carpenter complained of severe pain in the lower part of his bowels on Saturday, and on Sunday morning asked for a doctor, and said he could not get well without a surgical operation. Brown went to Dr. Mitchell, but Carpenter only breathed twice after the doctor arrived.

Other testimony was taken proving that the woman was in the habit of kicking and beating Carpenter in the most unmerciful manner, and at various places, and always when kicking him aimed at the lower part of his bowels. Carpenter, although a powerful man, never resisted, but in the language of one of the witnesses, "just stood and took it."

After hearing the testimony, Dr. Barker, assisted by Dr. Mitchell, made a post mortem examination of the body, and found sufficient inflammation in the parts indicated, in his opinion, to produce death.

The jury returned the following verdict: That Frederick Carpenter came to his death, in Mahoning Township, on the thirtieth day of September, 1866, and that it was the result of kicks and blows inflicted by Catherine Carpenter, his reputed wife.

The Coroner thereupon issued his warrant for the arrest of Catherine, and she was arrested and brought to Newcastle and lodged in jail to await her trial. —Newcastle Gazette.

GREAT FIRE AT TIDOUPT.

On Friday the twelfth instant, at half-past one o'clock in the afternoon, an explosion took place at the Thompson mill, caused by the bursting of a six hundred barrel oil-tank which was full of oil. This oil immediately came in contact with the fire of the engine, and almost instantly connected with another large tank holding five hundred barrels of oil, when the conflagration became general. In its mad march the fire consumed one corner only of a derrick, which allowed it to fall upon the safety-valve of an engine near by and in operation, and which cut off the escape of steam. In a few moments after the boiler blew up with a terrific noise, carrying a large part of the "green sheet" of the boiler half way up the adjacent hill.

At the instant of the explosion a vast sheet of oil on fire was carried a great distance up the hill, burning and singeing everything in its course. Teamsters who had left their wagons while getting their dinner returned to find them a charred wreck. Several horses were badly singed, especially an old white horse, that lost one of his eyes by the fire and the half of his coat, one entire side of him being scorched to a snuff color.

The cause of the fire is attributed to the defective hooping of the six hundred barrel tank at the Thompson mill. This fire was right in the heart of the Tidoupt oil region, and would naturally be supposed to have made quite a vacuum; but we are informed by an eye-witness that while the fire was almost at its height contracts were being made for new oil-houses and derricks, and that some building material was brought on the ground, and that the whole burnt district is by this time four times of going to press all alive with carpenters and mechanics now recovering the debris and erecting new machinery. Had the fire occurred at night the loss of life would have been fearful to contemplate.

The Tidoupt Chronicle of the twelfth instant says that the following wells were destroyed:

Their names, Haines, Elderton, Barker, Crook and Hamilton, P. Sturgis, Dingman, Gilbert, Hart, Ryan, Rising Sun, Souda, Grondale, First and Second, Keop, Storrow, Fremont, first and second, Lake Erie, Clark, McNaair, Strong, Henderson, and a number which were going down; also five wells on the Dingy area.

The Dennis Run Company lost one thousand barrels of oil, several hundred feet of pipe, tanks, etc.

Quite a number were burned, and several are reported missing. We are able to report Mr. — (he does not wish his name stated), badly burned in the face, hands, etc., but very durable.

Henry Righton, in face and arms; not dangerously.

Henry Anderson, back and arms; not dangerously.

Dr. Bolard was called in and dressed the wounds of the above-named parties—all of them workmen near where the fire originated.

The loss cannot now be accurately estimated; probably seventy-five to one hundred thousand dollars.—Oil City Register.

HORRIBLE PARRICIDE.

A DAY or two since we had the brief details of the murder of Jesse Rose, by his son, James Rose, aged about nineteen, and the further fact that the young man had confessed the parricide, and implicated his mother in the crime. The following are the particulars: It appears that the father, Jesse Rose, has been in the habit of drawing the money his sons had earned by their labor in the neighborhood, and said he was going to draw some forty-five dollars due the oldest son, who is nineteen years old, on Friday last. His son told him if he did he would kill him. The father went to a spelling-school on that day, but it appears did not get the money. The son, however, supposing he had got it, by his mother's instigation, and accompanied by his younger brother, hid behind a stump, near some bushes, by which the father would return. Before his father arrived, the younger became frightened at the deed they contemplated, and fled. As Rose passed the stump the oldest son struck him with the axe he had with him, knocking his brains out, and then leaving the body lying till morning, when he gave the alarm to the neighbors, who found the body on Saturday morning some three hundred yards from the house. Upon searching the house, bloody clothes were found with some of the brains on them; also the axe with which the deed was done. They arrested the mother and both sons, when the oldest immediately confessed the deed. Rose was a lazy, shiftless sort of fellow, and the mother less not born a good name for some time. The above facts are all that have so far been elicited.—Chicago Tribune.
