**BLUE JAY.**  
**Adulterating and Underweighing of Foodstuffs Continues.**  
 Underweighing, misbranding and adulterating food stuffs continues, notwithstanding the active crusade of the pure food officials in Washington, and under the state laws, and while arrests and convictions are made, much remains to be achieved in breaking up the nefarious practices of cheating and poisoning the buying and consuming public. The foodmakers adulterate barley meal with oatmeal and oats and chaff. They put metallic silver in candies and glucoses in jellies and preserves. "Foreign cream" cheeses are made of American skimmed milk. Artificially colored alcohol—alcohol is a food—conveys its wicked nourishment in bottles labeled "Choice Canadian Whiskey." The household flavoring extracts are tinted with coal tar dyes. Egg custard powders appear dried without eggs. Two-pound cans of tomatoes weigh one and a half ounces short, and brand of condensed milk are found twenty per cent. short of their labeled contents. In "spring water" are microbes of disease. Nutshells and fruit pits are fed into the pepper grinder. Strychnine is put in gin, lead chromatic in coffee and atropine in castor oil. And what adulterations we miss in foods, we make up in clothing, in cotton and shoddy for wool, silk is stiffened and adulterated, to go to pieces with the first few wears or exposure to wet, colors of goods fade out with the first washing, or the cotton pull apart and lose weight with their first wetting. Whether it is rubber, tin or other ware, no one expects to get the wear and good out of material or stuff they buy that they once did. It appears to be a game of gouge all around.
