### April Historical Events.

Last Sunday, April 9th, was the 46th anniversary of the surrender of Gen. Lee, Commander-in-Chief of the Confederate Army, to Gen. U. S. Grant, which occurred at Appomatax, April 9th, 1865.

Wednesday, April 12th, saw the close of just fifty years since the beginning of the late Civil War. Fort Sumpter was fired on by the South, April 12th, 1861.

April 12th, was also the 134 anniversary of the birth of Henry Clay, which occurred April 12th, 1777.

To-day, Thursday, April 13th, is the 168 anniversary of the birth of Thomas Jefferson, the third President of the United States.

To-morrow, Friday, April 14th, it will be just 46 years since President Abraham Lincoln was assassinated, at Washington, D. C., by Wilkes Booth as he was witnessing the production of "Our American Cousin" in Ford Theatre. Lincoln died the following morning, April 15th, at 7:30 o'clock.

April 18 and 19th will be the fifth anniversary of the great earthquake and fire at San Francisco at which time so many people lost their lives and so much valuable property was destroyed.

April 19th, will mark the 136th anniversary of two great battles of the Revolutionary War, which took place at Lexington and Concord in 1775.

April 23rd, will be the anniversary of the birth of Shakespeare, which occurred in England, April 23rd, 1564. He gave to the world some of the greatest writings ever known.

April 27th, will mark the anniversary of the birth of one of the United States' best soldiers and statesmen, U. S. Grant, 18th president of the United States.

April 30th, will be the 122nd anniversary of the inauguration of Washington as first president of the United States.


