BRIDGE AND CRESSON RAILROAD. After Monday, April 19, 1867, this road will run as follows: ...

Mr. Editor.—On the first Sunday of October the commencement of another important religious improvement will be made in our city. A solemn laying of the corner stone of a German Catholic school house, to be erected on that fine spring or the corner of Magnolia and Spring streets, which Rev. H. Lemke purchased about four years since, and has recently commenced to improve. The purchase of this large plot of ground by the Rev. Father Henry was a matter of surprise to his congregation, many of whom wondered what he intended to use for, but now the mystery has been revealed. Last Sunday the venerable pastor, St. Michael's announced that he had obtained the approbation of the Bishop, and consent of his congregation, to transfer the old church site at South street to this new and more suitable location, which he had by his own means purchased, but now entirely devotes to this religious purpose.

It is intended, however, to commence first with the School and Sisters' house, which will be at the same time large enough to receive the city's share of the German Catholic Church of this city, but also those of other cities of the diocese. It will, we understand, be a large and imposing structure, 36 feet wide by 100 feet long, and 2-1/2 stories high. We have no doubt of the speedy completion of this new work, as it is not the first institution of this kind that Father Henry has inaugurated and successfully carried out. We noticed a short time since, in one of the Pennsylvania journals, that he was the purchaser of a large tract of land in Cambria county, Pa., where he commenced and reared the infant settlement, Carrolltown, home of the first Catholic Bishop of the United States. This has since grown into a large and flourishing place, with religious institutions belonging to the Benedictines. May his undertaking now, though not so extensive as his former one, be equally advantageous to his flock.

The Vicar General of the Diocese, Rev. B. J. Miller, on Sunday, Oct. 7, addressed the people. A large turn out of the Catholic congregations is expected.

BARNS DESTROYED BY FIRE.—A large barn located on the farm of Mr. Robert Edwards, (at present occupied by his son) in Blacklick township, some seven or eight miles from this place, was totally destroyed by fire, on Sunday night last, together with the entire stock of grain, hay, harness and one calf belonging to Mr. Edwards, as well as a wagon owned by one of his neighbors. There seems to be no room to doubt that the fire was the work of an incendiary, as there had been no one about the barn who had any business there, the family having been absent during the day at church, and only reached home at a late hour of the night, when they discovered the barn to be on fire and the flames under such headway that it was impossible to extinguish them. Mr. Edwards' loss will probably exceed \$3,000. We did not learn whether he had any insurance.

We hope to see our young friends greeted by a large and appreciated audience.

JOHNSTOWN, Oct. 21, 1867. Dear Freeman.—The past week has been a trying one on local reporters, and your correspondents, after valiant endeavoring to hunt up an interesting item, is compelled to apologize for a community as large as this which will allow an entire week to go by without creating the least sensation.

SHARJUR R. RYCKMAN, Chief of Police at this place, met with a very severe accident at Pittsburgh, (where he was in attendance at the hearing of the alleged shovers of counterfeit money) about 3 o'clock on Friday morning last. He had went to the depot for the purpose of returning home, and reached it just in time to see the train move off, and while attempting to overtake it, fell through some trestle-work and sustained a fracture of two ribs and other injuries about his person. He returned home in the evening, however, and is now doing well.

A man named Martin fell from the Emigrant train on the Pennsylvania railroad, about three miles west of this place, on Tuesday last week, while it was under full headway, and singular to say, escaped with only a few slight bruises.

An alarm of fire was given on Cider st., one day last week, and the "steak-squirt" was promptly on the ground, but a few buckets of water, judiciously applied, subdued the threatened conflagration. The fire originated in a defective fuse.

A widow lady residing in Conemaugh borough, named Mrs. Lynch, had a valuable cow killed to-day at the head of Portage st., by the C. I. Co.'s engine.
