SPORN ROBBED.—We learn that the store of E. A. Irvin, at Curwensville, was entered early on the morning of the 15th inst. and robbed of several articles of dry goods, and report says, some cash. Our friend, Joseph Showers, was sleeping in the store at the time, but the burglars very prudently failed to arouse him.

WIDE AWAKE CAPES.—We thought that these articles were only intended to distinguish the "irrepressibles" from their fellow mortals, during the late campaign, but upon visiting the river a day or two ago, we observed one put to a much better use, by shielding the shoulders of a lady ruffian from the peltings of the storm. If these capes had not been instrumental in causing the mischief from which the country is now suffering, we would be happy to recommend them to all our ruffian friends.

OUR CONGRESSIONAL DISTRICT.—By the new apportionment bill as reported in our Legislature, the 24th, or "Wild Cat" District, is about being transposed into the 18th, by striking out Venango and Clarion counties, and substituting Erie, which, as a Republican remarked, "was to make it perfectly safe for them."

From the lower end of Cameron county to the Ohio line, covers about half the length of the whole State, and from the Cambria county line to the New York line, covers over one half the width of the State. From the ponderous size of the district it might be justly termed the Elephant district, but its shape more fitly suggests the name of Dromedary.

RATINGS.—The late rains have given our lumbermen a capital opportunity of getting to market. During Sunday and Monday all our lumbering streams were unusually high, and the river is still in good rafting order to day. A great destruction of lumber has taken place between this place and the foot of the hills, caused by the great amount of lumber afloat, sometimes four and five rafts staying at once, most of which will be a total loss.

We heard an old Pilot remark, that there was more lumber staved on Monday alone, than was ever known before in one whole season.

By the latest accounts we have from below, sales were made at Lock Haven at from four and a half to seven and a half for pine and oak according to quality, and that at Middletown, Marietta, and other eastern markets nothing is doing by way of sales—buyers are holding off, expecting a large run of lumber.

### The President's Proclamation.

Twenty-five Thousand Militia Ordered Out—An Extra Session of Congress Called.

Whereas, the laws of the United States late for some time past, and now are, opposed, and the execution thereof obstructed in the States of South Carolina, Georgia, Alabama, Florida, Mississippi, Louisiana and Texas, by combinations too powerful to be suppressed by the ordinary course of judicial proceedings, or by the powers vested in the Marshals by law:

Now, therefore, I, ABRAHAM LINCOLN, President of the United States, in virtue of the power in me vested by the Constitution and laws, have thought fit to call forth, the militia of the several States of the Union to the aggregate number of twenty-five thousand, in order to suppress said combinations, and to cause the laws to be duly executed.

The details for this object will be immediately communicated to the State authorities through the War Department. I appeal to all loyal citizens to favor, facilitate and aid this effort to maintain the honor, the integrity, and the existence of our national Union and the perpetuity of popular government, and to redress wrongs long enough endured.

I deem it proper to say that the first service assigned to the forces hereby called forth will probably be to repossess the forts, places and property which have been seized from the Union; and in every event the utmost care will be observed, consistently with the objects aforesaid, to avoid any destruction of or interference with, property, or any disturbance of peaceful citizens in any part of the country; and I hereby command the persons composing the combinations aforesaid to disperse and retire peaceably to their respective abodes within twenty days from this date.

Witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand, and caused the seal of the United States to be affixed. Done at the city of Washington, this fifteenth day of April, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and sixty-one, and of the independence of the United States the eighty-fifth.
