THE REMAINS OF GEN. WORTH.—Col. Darling arrived at New Orleans on the 11th inst., on the steamship Galveston from Texas, with the remains of the gallant Gen. Worth.

The Pennsylvania Railroad Company have concluded an arrangement with the Harrisburg and Lancaster Railroad Company, by which the cars of the Pennsylvania road will run through from Lewistown to Dillerville. The Eagle Line of cars is drawn off entirely.

A vessel has arrived at New London, Conn., from Davis Straits, the captain and crew of which speak of hearing Sir John Franklin's ships in Prince Regent's Inlet. The natives say that the ships had remained there four seasons, embedded in the ice, and were still surrounded by ice. The Indians also reported that the crews were alive and well.

This agrees with a report by the Niagara, which had been received at Hull, England.

LOGGERS HYPOCRISY.—Mr. Deal the recently elected Sheriff of Philadelphia, entered upon his duties last week, and in advance made a "clean sweep" of all the incumbents. Not even the driver of the prison wagon, or the bill-poster escaped. There were hungry applicants for every post, and the doctrine of Loggocoinism, that "to the victors belong the spoils," forbade that a single officer, no matter how competent or capable should be retained.

The Mississippi Senator paid a visit to Mr. Buchanan in Lancaster lately. He once declared in the Senate that, if a Northern man came to his State, and dared to avow sentiments in opposition to slavery, he would be ready to assist in hanging him upon the first tree that offered. And yet in the face of this fact, says the Columbia Spy, we can find journals of our own State, who in noticing his visit, speak of him as "the fearless and eloquent champion of Democracy."

We have seen, says the Baltimore American, a late letter from London, which mentions a sale of sixteen thousand tons of Railroad Iron, for the United States, at 52. 2d. per ton—an aggregate cost of about half a million of dollars.

We hope some of the advocates of free trade in this county will calculate how many men would have been employed, and what quantity of produce they and their families would have consumed, had these SIXTEEN THOUSAND TONS been manufactured here, at fair rates for labor, instead of being made by the pauper labor of England. Such is one of the effects of a free trade tariff, and the above one instance out of a hundred in which railroad companies have resorted to Europe for iron rails, simply because a locofoco tariff admits them at a duty ruinous to the American laborer.

THE PHILADELPHIA SUN.—The editor of the Philadelphia Sun, who is an office-holder in the custom house, thinks that there ought to be a new paper established at Harrisburg to give a more effectual support to the administrations of the National and State Governments, and talks as if the whigs were ready to fall in with such an absurd scheme. The Telegraph is now one of the best conducted papers in the State, and it, as well as the Intelligencer, gives entire satisfaction to the wings of the interior.

The editor of the Ledger, it would appear from the following paragraph, is turning Mahomedan. Speaking of a probable war in Europe, he says:

Such a war would bring a new element into the politics of Europe, in aid of liberal institutions. Mahomedanism, which is now progressive, and has always been highly favorable to social morals, as appears in the superior honesty, sobriety, charity and piety of all Mahomedan communities, would aid toleration against the corruption of the Roman and the rapacity of the Greek churches.

Being "highly favorable to social morals," must mean the allowance of four wives and as many concubines as a man can support, which the Koran grants; and "democratic in tendency," an absolute despotism, which strikes off heads at the nod of a Sultan or Pasha, and bastinadoes every poor devil who is brought before a magistrate, whether guilty or not.

The Paris Moniteur of last night states that the French Government entirely disavows the conduct of M. Pousin. It also announces the appointment of M. Bois Le Compt, at present French Minister at Turin, to be Minister Plenipotentiary at Washington.

The Times of this morning has letters of the 27th ultimo, from its correspondent at Naples, giving some curious information concerning the large United States fleet now in that bay.

The note of Lord Palmerston in regard to Turkey, and the answer, have been communicated by the King of Naples to the Great Powers. The affairs of Sicily are nearly arranged. Prince Casarino is to be Viceroy.
