The great Madison Garden races are things of the past and the nearest possible approach to them in the future will be the Astley belt contests which are to occur there; and they, too. will cease to be interesting when the public at large learn the history of that belt and the jobs put up to have it brought here now and then. Rowell is the greatest pedestrian in the world, and I know it to be a fact that he can beat all records thus far, even if 600 or more miles were necessary. He is to-day worth £17,000, all of which he earned in this country in his two great races and subsequent exhibitions.

Edward Payson Weston has seen his best day, by virtue of age. In his prime he was one of the best 'peds' that ever struck saw-dust. No professional walker no one has died under his charge, and only three persons have died during that has made more money, and none have spent it faster. To-day he has, perhaps \$3000 or \$4000 in his wife's name, but no more.
