OUR FOREIGN VISITORS. Movement of the French Emperor. NEW YORK, Mar. 4.—Count De Lesseps and his party left this city for Washington in the ten o'clock train. After a stay of three days in Washington the party will go to Philadelphia where Madame De Lesseps and her three children will remain while the count goes to Chicago and San Francisco, reaching New York again by the end of the month.

PARIS AT ST. LOUIS. St. LOUIS, March 4.—Mr. Parnell and his associates arrived at eleven o'clock this morning and were met at the depot by Mayor Overstol, and representatives of the various organizations. There were no formal ceremonies in the depot and the party were quietly driven to the Lindell house.

SHORT SHERIFF. Gen. Melick's Would-be-Assassin to Swing To-Morrow. St. PETERSBURG, March 4.—The man who fired upon Gen. Melick, yesterday, as he was alighting from a carriage at his residence, is a converted Jew named Molsky, from Minsk, a town distant 430 miles southwest of Petersburg. He has been tried and sentenced to-day, and will be hanged to-morrow. He maintains a defiant demeanor.

IRISH RELIEF. France Joining Hands. PARIS, March 4.—An Irish relief committee has been formed here and amongst the contributors is Marshal MacMahon. The archbishop of Paris has already forwarded fifty thousand francs to Ireland.

ONTARIO'S CONTRIBUTION. TORONTO, March 4.—The premier of Ontario cabled yesterday to the lord mayor of Dublin to draw at sight on the provincial treasurer for \$20,000.

THE TELEGRAPH WAR. An Injunction Against the American Union. NEW YORK, March 4.—An injunction was granted in the superior court in this city this morning, restraining the American Union telegraph company from occupying or using the wires of the Atlantic and Pacific company, lately seized by the Baltimore and Ohio railroad company.

FIRE IN KENTUCKY. The Town of Winchester Threatened with Destruction. WINCHESTER, Ky., March 4.—For two hours yesterday morning destruction of this town by fire was imminent. The fire originated in Martin's grocery and spread to adjacent buildings, destroying the Boone corner, Mrs. Taylor's building and Thompson's block. Loss, \$15,000.

DIPLOMATIC CHANGES. Rumored Transfers in the Italian Service. ROME, March 4.—It is rumored here that Count Carti, the present Italian ambassador at Constantinople, will be transferred to Paris and that Baron Blanc, the Italian minister at Washington will succeed Count Carti at Constantinople.

REMOVED TO A HIGHER TRIBUNAL. Chester Fuller's Case Taken to the Supreme Court. PHILADELPHIA, March 4.—In the case of Chester B. Fuller, son of Henry Fuller, of Easton, Judge Paxson, on application of counsel for defendant, granted the allocatur removing the case to the supreme court. This suspends Judge Green's sentence, and the young man is set at liberty pending final decision.

ASSESSORS ARRESTED. Charged with Refusing to Assess Duty Quoted. WILMINGTON, Del., Mar. 4.—The United States marshal this morning arrested George C. Ward and Thomas Hughes, assessors for Wilmington, on the charge of refusing to assess Republicans who desired to pay their taxes and thus be qualified to vote.

ENDING A DISPUTE. Anticipating the Courts in Illinois. PEORIA, Ill., March 4.—Jeremiah Webster and John Gutliff, farmers living near Chillicothe, in this county, have had a dispute for several months about the division line between their respective farms. On Tuesday Webster started to build a fence on the disputed line and Gutliff shot him in the head, from the effects of which he died. Gutliff was arrested.

VIRGINIA'S JUDICIAL SENSATION. Dispensers of Justice in the Old Dominion Under Arrest. DANVILLE, Va., March 4.—Judge Rives ordered a writ for the arrest of County Judges Coles, Parrish and others for trial at his court, in Lynchburg, at the March term, in accordance with the decision of the United States supreme court.

EIGHT YEARS IN PRISON. Frank Gudofski's Crime and Punishment. WILKESBARRE, Pa., March 4.—Frank Gudofski, who pleaded guilty of the murder of John Blumm and left decision with the court, was this morning adjudged guilty of murder in the second degree and sentenced to eight years imprisonment.
