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COLUMBIA NEWS. OUR REGULAR CORRESPONDENCE.

General Welsh Post No. 118, G. A. R., will meet this evening and elect officers. The ice in the canal between here and Chickies is reported as being full of holes.

The temperature to-day is decidedly colder than yesterday. The mercury is these sudden turns is having things its own way.

"Forty hours' devotion" will commence in St. Peter's Catholic church on Sunday next and will continue until Tuesday evening.

The Vigilant fire company at its meeting this evening, will elect officers to serve during the ensuing year.

A number of ladies and gentlemen will meet at the residence of A. J. Kaufman, this evening, for the purpose of organizing a permanent organization to meet weekly at the residences of its several members.

The school board at its meeting on Thursday evening, will decide whether the teachers of the public schools shall be allowed their pay, due on the 1st of January, before the holidays at the regular time.

The Columbia fire company will hold its annual ball in Odd Fellows' hall, on New Year's eve, and the Shawnee fire company will do the same evening in the armory.

The teachers of the Columbia public schools have received orders to forbid their pupils drinking from any drinking cup but their own—this rule is intended in force until abrogated. The rule is posted as a precautionary measure against the spreading of diphtheria in the schools and is to be commended. That it will have beneficial results is almost certain.

Messrs. Abram Brenner & Bro. are at present busily engaged in piling up logs and all loose rough lumber in the inlet just below their saw mill. They wish to be in season in case of an ice freshet.

The arms, uniforms and equipments of company H were subjected to the rigid monthly inspection last evening, and the company was given an old time lively drill with Corp. L. W. Richards as acting first sergeant. Those delinquent members were dropped from the rolls by the company court martial.

The dam between the bridge and the dam the river is again clear of ice. Yesterday the steambath "Wrightsville" plowed its way through the ice to this side of the river to open a channel to low canal boats for one side to the other, and then, after breaking up the ice on the other side, chutes another channel was formed from the outlet at the bridge to the raft chutes in the dam, the latter to carry away loose and broken ice before it could reform.

The men worked well, but during last night a heavy snow storm set in, which, with the aid of the high winds which had sprung up was carried away, over the dam and down the river.

The ice was not of sufficient thickness to damage the dam to any extent, and we judge, everything about there is all right. There is a rise in the river of about a foot since yesterday afternoon, and on this rise ice could easily float away. This morning a couple of canal boats arrived at the dam, and if they are not broken up, they will be loaded and they will remain here during the winter. A row boat which has broken loose from somewhere is floating amidst the broken ice in the chutes. Above the bridge the ice remains solid and there is not but little probability of its breaking.

Coroner's Verdict. The coroner's jury in the case of John Bruder, the boy who was drowned on Saturday evening in the canal, returned in the court house yesterday afternoon at 3 o'clock and rendered a verdict of "accidental drowning."

A NOTICE CHANGING THE TIME OF LETTING THE MARKET STALLS AND STANDS. SECTION 1. Be it ordained by the Select and Common Councils of the city of Lancaster in council assembled, that the time of letting the stalls and stands on the first Wednesday of April next, for the term of one year, shall be on the first Wednesday of January following.

SECTION 3. All ordinances or parts of ordinances inconsistent with the foregoing are hereby repealed.
