## HUMBUGGING.

A STREET MAN'S GIVE AWAY GAME.

How the Merchants of the Thoroughfares impose upon the Credulity of Americans.—A Risky Game Played With Good Success.

"Do you know," said a man who was selling jewelry from a dry goods box to a reporter for the *Lancaster Intelligencer*, "that the Americans are the easiest humbugged people of any in the world? It is true, and I have helped to humbug them about as much as the average man." Somebody had just been reading an account of the Louisville lottery drawing, which brought forth the speech.

"Can't you tell us some of your experience in that line?" asked a man near.

"Well, you would laugh to know what fools people make of themselves sometimes. About two years ago I was down in Brunswick, where I saw a fellow holding a perfect quart game, but which was the most out and out steal I ever heard of. His plan was simple, and hundreds of the very best people of the town flocked to give him a trial. He rented a store and put a show case across a counter in the center. Above the case he knew, my hat full of ten and twenty dollar gold coins, piled in a heap in one corner, and in the other about the same sized pile of silver dollars. A dice box and six dice completed his outfit. By paying half a dollar he had one throw with the dice. If he threw six sixes he took the entire pile of gold; if he threw six aces he was entitled to all the silver. Of course, no one ever threw all the sixes, neither was it possible to get the aces to come all in a bunch. A night as well expected to get struck by lightning from a cloudless sky at noonday as to throw six aces; it is almost an impossibility, that's all. Well, the fellow made several hundred dollars and left."

"Did you ever hear how easy it is to fool a man with soap?" asked the talker. "We street men know, that as an old story, of course. I was down at Troy, Ala., several months ago, when a fellow came along most straggled. He went to a grocery store, bought a few bars of transparent, or clear, soap, and wrapped it in colored tissue paper very neatly and then covered the package with tin foil, sprinkling the whole with a bottle of cologne to give it a good smell. Well, sir, the fellow got on a box and soon gathered a crowd by his talking, and proposed to take out all the grease from his hats, coats, &c., that could be brought in. The first case presented was the city marshal, who walked up with a great spot in his coat which he wanted taken out. The fellow carried a sponge well saturated with benzine and articles, which of itself will take out almost anything, and by using a bit of soap, soon had the marshal's coat entirely free from grease. That started the soap sales, and in two or three hours, it being Saturday and a crowd in town, the soap man had sold \$36 worth, nearly all of which was clear profit."

Stopping to draw a long breath, the jewelry man continued his interesting story. "I tell you you can humbug any body. I am not unlike the rest of the world. I believe I could bite at my own tricks if I could only get in the crowd."

"While I was at Brunswick, Ga., some time ago, I took revenge on the town by playing what we term 'give away racket.' It's a mighty fine thing to play, and a very dangerous one in some localities. I had been using a big umbrella, large enough to cover fifty people, when one night on the street a crowd of sailors, led on by some of the town boys, threw rotten eggs at the umbrella and broke up the crowd. Then I reached on the 'give away racket.' A fellow has to be mighty careful about working it, or he will get caught out. It can only be played once in a town."

"The way to do it is this: Get a lot of fine gold rings which cost about a dollar a dozen, and propose to be advertising some big gold concern in New York. I called mine the great braided gold of San Francisco, stated that I would show the crowd a thing or two, and soon got them interested. First, I made a speech in which I stated my business; then I commenced to offer the rings at any price from two cents up, telling them that they could not be bought for less than \$4 apiece at a jeweler's. I let out about twenty rings at two cents, and then asked everybody who had bought them to hold them up. Instantly every ring was in the air. 'Now,' said I, 'addressing the crowd, 'this is your money is it?' 'Yes,' said a dozen. 'And you give it freely for the rings?' 'Yes,' came again in chorus. 'Very well; here's twenty cents for you; and so on around the crowd. They commenced to wonder what on earth I meant, said I was crazy, and a lot of other things; but I told them I was advertising goods for my house, and had plenty more things to give away. Next I took up a pair of my handsome diamond studs, which, I explained, were Lako George diamonds, equal to any on earth, &c., and that I was going to sell them from twenty-five cents up—the more one paid the better it would be of course; for him. Twenty studs were soon out and the same speech made. Then I made the crowd hold up the diamonds, and each man got fifty cents back who had bought."

"The thing began to get very interesting, and the crowd numbered three or four hundred. Then I took out some beautiful gold-plated sleeve buttons, which I explained could not be bought for less than \$12. These I proposed to sell for fifty cents each, giving to all who bought \$1 additional as before, each time doubling the money gift. The buttons soon went off, as did the other things, and I was ready for the final 'bite' at the crowd. The twenty pair of sleeve buttons had been sold for half a dollar, and I had given back twenty silver dollars. 'That fellow's a darned fool,' I heard all around me, but I applied to this by saying that last week in Macon, I had given away \$1,500, and that I was ready to do it again."

"The crowd was perfectly crazy to see what came next. It was watch chains. The chains I was to sell at any price from \$3.50 to anything above that, and the more they paid the better it would be for them. I hinted that the watches would come next, and this let them off like a lot of madmen. The trick now was to sell as many chains as possible at \$3.50. In this one was \$10 in silver and some paper to make it stand out and look like the one I had dropped. All this had been arranged beforehand, of course. With a whoop I swung the bag around my head after

stopping to pick it up where I first dropped it, and up it went into the air. Great heavens! you should have seen the mob! I never saw anything like it. They fought like tigers over the handkerchief, while I took occasion to leave the spot. I had also arranged to bring the thing to a climax about the time the Albany train left, so I was driven at once to the depot. I was just \$280 ahead. But I got very weak in the knees while waiting at the depot. I was a little too soon, and about a dozen young men ran up, raising the very mischief of a noise, which I thought was for me, and it proved to be true. They saw me and came around me laughing and knocking each other like crazy men. I didn't know what on earth was the matter until they finally told me it was the best joke that had ever been played on Brunswick, and although they had been victimized, they wanted to assure me it was all right.

"I had sold the chains to nearly all the best men in Brunswick, some of them paying me as high as \$5 for them. I was satisfied to leave, and had my revenge. You may put it down for a fact that any average American crowd can be humbugged the same way every day in the year."

ELOPED ON HER WEDDING DAY.

A Chestnut Hill Woman Leaves Word That She Has Gone With a Better Man.

On the fourth anniversary of her wedding Mrs. Violet Green, the young wife of Henry Green, of Rex avenue, Chestnut Hill, Philadelphia, deserted her husband and eloped last night with Adolph Brewer. Mrs. Green took her little daughter with her, but Brewer left a wife and two children behind. Having sent her husband to the city to do some shopping, the faithless wife proceeded leisurely to pack up what she wanted and sent for an expressman to cart them to the depot.

Mr. Green returned home about 9 o'clock at night, when he was thunder-struck upon hearing of the conduct of his wife. He went to bed in a rage, and when he awoke he found that she had gone off with a better man than her husband, and stated that she had taken her child with her "as a mother should." This was the first intimation the husband had that the child was his wife's daughter. She had adopted it soon after their marriage from an orphan asylum, and although its resemblance to his wife had frequently been noted and commented upon, the fond husband suspected nothing until he received the cruel letter of farewell. At first he said that he would follow her to the end of the earth and bring her back home, but he has since thought better of it, and said that he proposed to make application at once for a divorce. Mrs. Green is a very decided brunette, and is said to be quite prepossessing in appearance.

The Big Poker Game Afloat Settled.

At Newburgh, N. Y., District Attorney Anthony moved and obtained from Judge Brown an order to nolle prosequi the indictments against Dr. Montville M. Hedges and William H. Smith, who were charged with swindling F. P. Weed in that notable big poker game. The nolle prosequi is the result of an agreement whereby a settlement has been reached. It is said that the overtures for a compromise came from Weed, who has agreed to accept \$20,000 as a full settlement of the matter. This amount comes from Hedges, Scott and the friends of the latter. By the articles of agreement not only the criminal proceedings against Hedges and Scott are to be discontinued, but the civil suits against them are also stopped. Weed's first cash payment of his poker debt was \$25,000 instead of \$20,000, as has been stated. Then he paid \$50,000 on the first note and \$35,000 on the second, making in all \$110,000. He comes out of the affair as loser to the amount of about \$80,000.
