THE SCHOOL BOARD.

STATED MEETING LAST EVENING.

Reports of Committees and City Superintendent—School Tax Levied—Permanent Certificates.

A stated meeting of the board of directors of Lancaster city school district was held in common council chamber last evening. The following named members were present:

Messrs. Baker, Breneman, Brosius, Brown, Byrne, Darnstetter, Eberman, Evans, Hartman, Herr, Johnston, MacNeal, McCoskey, Morton, Oblander, Reimsnyder, Rhoads, Richards, Ringwalt, Samson, Schwebel, Slaymaker, Smeyle, Snyder, E. G., Spurrier, Warfel, Wilson, Zecher, Christian, Zecher, George W., Levergood, president.

Superintendent Committee.
Mr. McCoskey, from the superintendent committee, reported verbally that after the death of Miss Bair, teacher of the Sherman street school, Miss McNeal was put in charge of said school; that shortly afterwards she asked to be returned to her own school and her request was granted; that Miss Halbur was then placed in charge of the school, but in a short time she asked to be relieved. The pupils of the school were then transferred to other schools, a majority of them being placed in Miss Stahl's school in the adjoining building. Miss Stahl's assistant, Miss Smith, was called and was given permission to place her classes in the vacated school house, and they are now being taught therein. This arrangement makes it unnecessary to elect another teacher at present.

Mr. Warfel, from the superintendent committee, stated that for the purpose of equalizing the number of pupils in the several schools certain geographical lines had been established, beyond which pupils were not admitted. In violation of this rule, directors had given permits to pupils to attend schools beyond the established limits. In instances cases in which pupils lived close to the New street school were granted permits to seats in the Lemon street school; and in one instance a pupil in whose family scarlet fever was prevalent, the board had said that he refused a seat in the school to which she belonged, was given a permit to enter another school outside the proper district. He thought this was outrageous and it should be stopped. He understood that the board had said that he was (Mr. Warfel) was fussy about scarlet fever. He said that he had cause to dread the disease, as his youngest and brightest child had contracted it at school and now slept in the cemetery. He said that he had cause to dread the disease in his power to keep the dead disease out of the schools and hoped directors would be more prudent in granting permits.

The Finance Committee.
Mr. Evans, from the finance committee, presented the following bills, which have been examined and found correct: the bill of John Schleich's heirs, purchase money for lot on Ann street, \$1,000; W. T. Brown, professional in examining title of lots, purchased from Daniel Gempferling and John Schleich's heirs, \$20; D. Gempferling, purchase money for lot on Ann street, \$1,000; David McLean for work, \$2; Henry Young & Son, repairs to locks, &c., \$12.10; Hamilton estate, ground rent, \$13.27; H. Z. Rhoads, repairing clock in high school, \$1; Levi Powl, labor material, repairs, &c., \$14.90; H. E. Slaymaker, call for work, \$2; Steinman & Sons, advertising and printing, \$19.73; William H. Roy, rebounding dictionary, \$1.50.

School Tax Levied.
Mr. Evans presented also a resolution fixing the rate of taxation for school purposes for the ensuing year at three mills on the dollar valuation of all property taxable for school purposes, and providing for an abatement of three per cent. on all taxes paid before the 1st of August, the full amount to be paid from that date until the 1st of September, and 5 per cent. to be added to all taxes remaining unpaid after the 1st of September. The resolution was adopted.

Buildings and Grounds.
Mr. Slaymaker, from the committee on buildings and grounds, reported verbally that the committee had purchased the lots at the corner of Ann and King streets, on which to erect a new school house; that proposals for building the same had been advertised for, and the bids would be opened on Saturday, after which the contract would be awarded and the work pushed forward.

Funerals and Supplies.
Mr. Rhoads, from the committee on furniture and apparatus, stated that book cases were needed in some of the Lemon street school rooms. On motion, they were ordered to be erected.

Text Books.
Mr. Johnson, from the committee on text books, presented the following report:

LANCASTER, Pa., May 3, 1883.
To the President and Board of Directors of Lancaster School District:
Your committee on text books and course of instruction respectfully recommend that to the list of text books now used in the high schools be added "Whitney's German Reader" and "Allen's Latin Reader," and that one set of "Parley's Arithmetic (Charts)" be placed in one of the primary schools as an experiment, to be followed by their introduction into all the primary schools if the experiment proves to be a success.

City Superintendent's Report.
The city superintendent's report was read as follows:

LANCASTER, Pa., May 3, 1883.
To the Board of School Directors:
GENTLEMEN: Your city superintendent presents the following report for the month of April:

The whole number of pupils enrolled was 84, in the high schools, 211; secondary 1,001; primary, 1,974—total, 3,186. The average attendance was,—in the high schools, 200; secondary, 853; primary, 1,601—total 2,654.

The average percentage of attendance was 84, the number of visits made by the city superintendent, as reported by the teachers, was 113; by directors, 92, as follows: J. W. Byrne, 14; A. Richards, 11; W. A. Morton, 11; H. R. Breneman, 11; W. McCoskey, 15; H. E. Slaymaker, 6; C. Zecher, 3; Dr. J. Levergood, 3; J. G. Baker, 1; A. Z. Ringwalt, 1; Rev. C. Reimsnyder, 4; W. A. Wilson, 1.

Because of the unwillingness of teachers to take charge of one of the schools on East Orange street, it was decided to dis-

band it, and the pupils were accordingly distributed among the nearest schools of the same grade, thus saving the salary of one teacher to the districts and their health to teacher and pupils. Additional copies of the Child's Book of Nature to be used in the secondary schools are needed. Four primary schools in the Lemon street building and one in the James street building should be supplied with closets or book cases, as the district is not at all sufficient storage room for the books and apparatus in use in those schools.

The school rooms in the Lemon and James street buildings should each have at least thirty square feet (10ft. by 3ft.) of additional black-board, what is now there being entirely inadequate and less than in the other buildings. The annual examination of teachers, which the members of the board are respectfully invited to attend, will take place on the 19th of May.

After a rather warm debate, in which teachers, directors and parents came in for a share of censure, a motion made by Mr. Slaymaker was agreed to, directing the scarlet fever pupil to be dismissed from the Lemon street school and not permitted to attend any other school until the full term of two months shall have elapsed from the time the disease was contracted; and that all pupils attending schools outside of the prescribed boundaries be transferred to the schools to which they belong.

Revision of Rules.
Mr. Byrne called attention to the fact that there were certain points in the city superintendent's report that did not come under the chairmanship of any of the standing committees. He moved therefore that a special committee of three be appointed to consider the expediency of revising the rules, as suggested by the superintendent. The motion was agreed to, and the chair appointed Messrs. Byrne, Morton and Morton said committee.
