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THE HUNTING SEASON.

THE HUNTING SEASON. THE PLEASURES OF TRUE SPORT WITH DOG AND GUN IN PURSUIT OF THE WHITE AND RED RABBIT—RECOLLECTIONS OF A FORCED MARCH THROUGH THE LOWER END.

The partridge season will open on the 13th instant and sportsmen are taking dog and cleaning up their breech-loaders in eager anticipation of a day with the dogs in the cover. The rabbit season will begin with the first of November.

Time was, and time not so very long gone by, when partridges were plenty all over the county, and the hillsides of the lower end were sought by sportsmen every autumn, but now "high time" is more rarely met with in the shooting season, and those who know his haunts keep the valued secret close.

The birds have grown wiser in these days and keep close and quiet through the hunting months, but in the mating season of the early summer, their clear, bold voices may be heard, and as the summer passes and the peculiar note changes to the low "chit white" or "wheat's rattle" they often seem to lose all fear of man.

The writer swung in a hammock, one afternoon this summer, and whistled back replies to a partridge until he came full in view upon a fence rail not a hundred yds. away. Another call and answer and the bird was down on the ground running swiftly through the grass; then he saw me and like a flash was out of sight behind the bushes.

A faint gray streak in the east is the only sign of dawn as the hunters breakfast. They make a hearty meal, for the hunt may lead too far away to make dinner worth returning for, and they have a hard day's play before them.

Heavy clothing, strong shoes and leggings or the pantaloons tied closely to the ankle, several coats if it is cold, but by no means an overcoat, for movement must be untrammelled as reason of success. Hunting is better done without coats or gloves. Over all the cartridge vest or pouch, and shoulder-strap, the sportsman is ready for the fray.

The dogs know well that they are important to-day and are eager to prove that the elocution of their scent is not lessened in summer. Soon the men and dogs are on the ground and quartering across a stubble field with the north wind rising in the distance and the level rays of the rising sun touching the frost clad earth with an icy glimmer.

How cold, and damp and disagreeable it is. Then, the sun mounts higher and the steady tramping warms the blood the hunters feel more cheerful. They watch the dogs moving steadily and rapidly with an instinct as marvellous as reason of success. Hunting is better done without coats or gloves.
