THE SECRET and Manner of Fattening the Various Paris Together—The Rocks, Spinneys and Kousas Candies—A Knowledge of Chemistry Necessary.

POINTS ON FIREWORKS.

How THE MOST BEAUTIFUL FIREWORKS ARE MANUFACTURED.

The mysterious hieroglyphic legends which are to be found on the wrappers of fireworks lead one to infer that they are manufactured within the regions of the prehistoric land of fireworks—China. But in fact all fireworks used and sold in this country, as well as many thousands of the most complex pieces used in Europe, are the result of American industry and skill.

In conversation with a New York agent of fireworks the other day, the gentleman who was at one time the proprietor of an extensive pyrotechnic establishment in the East, gave me a very interesting description of how some of the simplest and most beautiful fireworks are made.

"The cracker, as all know," said the gentleman, "is the rocket, and as regards the noisier of all the fireworks, and hundreds of thousands of packages are sold each year. Next in popularity and number of sales stands the Roman candle, which is a harmless anything in the line made. They are composed of fuming powders and a few minute pellets of wax, which are contained in a paper cylinder from seven-sixteenths to seven-eighths of an inch in diameter. In this about a spoonful of Roman candle composition is dropped, and then thirty grains of rifle powder, on top of which are the colored balls. This is repeated again and again till the cylinder is filled up. When ignited the composition is the first to burn, after which the colored balls are forced out, and the operation continues until the candle is entirely consumed."

"The rocket, which is one of the finest pieces made, requires great care and experience, as the cylinder must stand a great deal of strain. The rocket is made of a burst and so a tar paper paper must be used for pyrotechnics is used. A steel spindle with a brass flange at the bottom and tapering to a point is inserted in the center of the rocket case is an inch, the spindle is half an inch in diameter, or one-half the inner diameter of the case, while the top of the spindle is placed in the center of the case and a spoonful of powder is dropped in. Then a rammer made of Russian iron, cylindrical in form, so that it may fit over the case, is placed in the case and pressed by a mallet of certain weight twelve times at a certain momentum, in order to settle the case and close up the end of the rocket case. It is absolutely of twice the length, and that number only, at the required momentum thrust.

Nextly in the use of the mallet is, of course, only a few grains of sulphur, charcoal and nitre is dropped in, and ten more bows are struck at certain intervals. The ten bows are dropped in it will cause the rocket to burst, and if more, the rocket will not ascend as high as it should. The cylinder is then charged with powder, and a one-half inch above the head of the spindle, and is closed with clay, through which a hole one-quarter of an inch in diameter is bored. The aperture left for the rocket to pass the fuse, the spindle holding the igniting composition in situ. In burning into the strata the result is a beautiful display of fire, of elastic fluid, and this in its efforts to rush through the aperture of clay and meeting resistance from the atmosphere—the resistance being of a nature such as is necessary to make the latter ascend. It should be stated that when a rocket is charged with powder, in the shape of small cubes, are tied on to the rocket, and as the rocket reaches the greatest height they burn with wonderful brilliancy. The query as to why rockets turn over after it has reached its greatest height.

"The cost of making fireworks is very evident when you consider that all the work has to be done by hand. The labor put upon these pyrotechnics is the item which costs as the materials are generally very expensive. "Can I tell you the revolving pieces are made?" Certainly. Manila paper is rolled over a spindle and paste is added between each large layer, to give greater strength. Then out of a cylinder with a conical aperture called a spindle hole is formed, and these cylinders are charged for the ordinary work with charcoal, sulphur, nitre, gunpowder and steel filings, the latter acting as a brilliant spark. The principal one with which I work is a mixture of charcoal, nitre and sulphur, and as a consequence you seldom hear of a catastrophe in a pyrotechnic establishment. The fireworks which are thrown in the air are made on the same general principle which I have enlarged upon, and the fire does not affect them because the force of the powder drives the water out.

"America beats the world as regards cheapness in making all kinds of fireworks, but the Chinese and Japanese are adepts of the unique designs and the variety of colors. I could give many other operations which are gone through with to produce intricate pieces, but it is rather too scientific to be interesting."
