

A CORNER-STONE LAYING.

INTRIGUING SERVICES ON SUNDAY AT THE RITE OF EMANUEL CHAPEL.

An Address by Rev. Houpt, Alluding to the Beginning and Prospects of the Sunday School at Walnut and Pine

The corner-stone of the chapel of the Evangelical Lutheran Sunday school of Emanuel, at the corner of Pine and Walnut streets, was laid this morning.

Promptly at 3 o'clock the children of that mission school marched from their temporary quarters to the bright prospect building to the platform placed over the foundation walls.

After the recitation of the apostles' creed and the singing of the gloria patria and the hymn "The Church's one Foundation," Rev. E. Z. Zell, of Philadelphia, was followed by the reading of a historical statement of the work by Rev. C. Elvin Houpt, under whose pastorate the mission was founded.

Rev. Houpt began this sketch by stating that for some time a Sunday school was greatly needed in this growing section of the city and that the first step in the matter was started, mainly through the instrumentality of Miss Kate A. Griel.

A Sunday school was started in the parlor of the residence of Wm. F. Zell, on January 1, 1888, with nine persons present.

It has a frontage of 60 feet on Walnut street and a depth of 150 feet on Pine street.

At the conclusion of the reading of the report and reference to the bright prospect for the school the hymn "Christ Is Our Corner-stone" was sung.

The corner-stone was the gift of Lewis Hilly & Son, and in it was placed a number of copies of the Bible, copies of Augsburg's mission Sunday school books, chapters of working societies, historical notices of the working school, list of members of the Sunday school, a list of the men who have thus far labored in the vineyard.

Hopkins states that he entered the cellar of the residence at 10 o'clock Sunday morning and remained there until he heard his wife's name called.

The motive for the deed is in the fact that Mrs. Hopkins in spite of his entreaties allowed the attention of other men, two of whom were identified as brothers.
