THE THIRTY-EIGHTH ANNUAL MEETING OF THE COUNTY SOCIETY OF TEACHERS AND NORMALS ATTEND THE INSTITUTE.

OPENING OF THE BUSINESS SESSION OF THE CENTENNIAL CONGRESS.
