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DEATH OF JOHN J. ASTOR.

NEW YORK'S WEALTHIEST CITIZEN DIES—CENSUS TO NEARLY \$10,000,000.

New York, Feb. 22.—John Jacob Astor died this morning at his residence on Fifth avenue, of heart failure.

Mr. Astor continued to sink slowly until 4 o'clock this morning, when he died. There were present at his bedside William Willford Astor and a couple of other relatives. Mr. Astor was born in 1822. He was probably the wealthiest man in New York.

TRYING TO SAVE HIS NECK.

A Noter That George Clark Did Not Assist in the Killing of Dreyfus.

PITTSBURGH, Feb. 22.—A movement is on foot to secure a reprieve for Geo. Clark, of Greene county, sentenced to be hanged for the murder and robbery of Dreyfus McCausland, of Allegheny City, on the ground that a witness on whom testimony Clark was convicted, was mistaken. Another man, Zach. Taylor, has also been condemned for the same crime and sentenced to be hanged in April.

Forming a New Town.

PITTSBURGH, Feb. 22.—There was a general caucus from this place of some prominent citizens yesterday across the river to a point about one mile up the river from Pierre, the object being to form a new town site on the Sioux reservation.

Englishmen to Invest \$50,000,000.

CHICAGO, Feb. 22.—A morning paper says that the English Stock Exchange is the largest in the world, will double soon be sold to an English syndicate. The price of this enormous plant with its acres of lands, miles of live stock pens and numerous sources of revenue is \$50,000,000 and a number of rich Englishmen are ready to exchange that sum of money for acquiring it.

The German Elections.
