Chas. Osborn, a brother of the late Benj. Osborn, of Brimfield, and uncle of H. L. Osborn and Mrs. M. Parsons, of this place, died at his residence in Spring Hill, Kansas, October 8th, 1888. He was born in Connecticut, Feb. 13, 1817, and when 7 years of age, moved to Ohio, with his parents. In 1845 he married Julia E. Underwood, who died in 1855. The same year he married Mrs. M. A. Sage, who survived. In the spring of 1856 he moved to Illinois, and from there to Kansas in 1860. He was a quiet, unassuming man, and was held in high esteem by all who knew him.

The grim reaper has passed this way and garnered a ripened harvest. John Kingsbury, who died at his residence on Lincoln Avenue, Ravenna, October 30, was one of our most highly respected and industrious citizens, one whose life was a practical example of his motto, "Peace on earth, and good will to all men." He was born in Hudson, Summit county, O., Dec. 18th, 1814, and spent his boyhood in that vicinity. On June 9th, 1838, he married Angeline Bishop, of Hudson, who died February 14th, 1877. The fruits of this marriage were six sons, all of whom are living, the oldest being 48 and the youngest 34 years of age. A few years after their marriage they moved to Parkman, Geauga county, and lived in that township and Bandyburg for several years, after which they removed to Ravenna, residing for many years in the northeast part of the township. In 1880 he married Mrs. Jane Nash, of Streetsboro, who survives him. For nearly six years they have resided on Lincoln Avenue, this city, and his host of friends and neighbors have learned to love him. His funeral on Saturday was very largely attended. He was buried in Maple Grove Cemetery, Rev. Andrew Wilson officiating.


