Loss of the Steamer Kent, and several lives.—We learn from the Detroit Express that the steamer Kent, plying between Detroit and Buffalo on the Canada side, was lost on Tuesday morning last.

The following are the names given us by the Clerk of the Kent, as missing: J. E. Quaw, Richard, Michigan; J. Lowling, Ypsalanti, Mi; Chas. Osborn, Genesee co. N. Y.; Mr. Deming, Berlin, Connecticut, and grandson, from Galena.

Two young ladies and a boy from near Ypsalanti, names not known. All the officers and hands of the boat and 79 passengers, including ten children, were saved.

Steamer Burned. The Louisville Journal states that on the morning of the 13th inst., the steamer Fawn, lying at Portland, was discovered to be on fire.

Terrible Explosion.—We learn from the Georgetown Standard of the 14th inst., that a terrific explosion took place at the mill of Messrs. Pagnburn & Carr, about a mile from Ripley, Brown Co., O. The engineer Mr.

Sowers, and a Mr. Hughes were killed instantly, and three other persons so seriously injured that they died in a few hours. All the men had families.

Fatal Affair.—The National Intelligencer of the 19th states, that on the evening previous, about six o'clock, Mr. Wm. Z. Kendall (son of Hon. Amos Kendall) was shot dead by Mr. Rufus Elliott, brother-in-law of John C. Rives.
