

Another Nest of Villains. The Shawneetown, Ill., Advocate contains an account of the breaking up of a gang of frebooters, and the arrest of several, whose combination was but little less than that one which lately created so much excitement in Michigan.

Their headquarters were on Wolfe's Island, Kentucky, near the corner of the States of Kentucky, Tennessee, Illinois and Missouri. The band was discovered no long since, through the failure of an attempt by one of the ringleaders, to murder a Dr. Swayne, who had recovered a judgment for some \$10,000 against Newton E. Wright, another prominent member of the gang. In May, 1850, Wright gave Aho Thomas, a man of desperate character, \$150 to kill Dr. S. Accordingly, Thomas, pretending to wish the Dr. to visit his sick father, enticed him from home, and attempted to murder him; but the Dr. after being shot in the arm, gave the alarm, and the desperado escaped. Notwithstanding every exertion was made to ferret out the villain, so deeply was the plot laid, that he was only accidentally discovered a short time ago; and his discovery led to the disclosure of the whole affair of the company.

They seem to have made a regular business of stealing slaves in one State, running them off to another, and then selling them. Another of their modes of speculation in negroes seems to have been as follows: Some of their emissaries would make a tour through some of the neighboring slave States, and enticing slaves to run away and providing their victims with means to get into southern Illinois. Arrived there, the fugitives were arrested by the runaways; fictitious claims to them were then set up, and maintained by false testimony and perjury. The slaves were then taken into one of the slave States and sold. They carried on another species of swindling upon an extensive scale by means of fictitious claims against such estates, they would prove the validity of their claim by some of their gang. In some cases they had gone so far as to take deposits, and were provided with county seals, and everything requisite to give their proofs the semblance of legality.

More Diabolical Maliquity of the Michigan Conspirators—Another Attempt to blow up the Central R. R. Depot—Two men burned. The May Flower, running between Buffalo and Detroit, in connection with the Central Rail Road, brought up to Detroit on her Saturday night's trip, a box marked in the usual way, as though containing goods and directed "Detroit," &c.

With other freight it was deposited in the big warehouse, or depot, belonging to the Central Rail Road. Early Sunday morning there was a terrible explosion heard in the direction of the Depot, and an examination it was found said box was one of those infernal machines used by the Michigan conspirators to set fire to or blow up buildings by slow match. One of the gang not yet arrested, no doubt, intended to blow up the boat, which belongs to the Central Rail Road, or else the Depot. No great damage was done, except that two innocent persons were disabled, by splashing oil.

The history of the country does not furnish accounts of a more extensive conspiracy, or more malignant banditti, than this it overshadowed the whole State of Michigan, and seems to have had in league every rogue throughout the Union. Their schemes of plunder are not yet half developed. They are now on trial at Detroit, and are defended by Senator SKRAMP, of New York, with what success remains to be seen.

FROM SAN JACINTO. Sr. Louis, June 28. We have advices from Santa Fe to the 30th of May.

Mr. Moorhead, Engineer, attached to the boundary commission, and Mr. Duncan and lady from New York, have arrived at Independence. Large bodies of friendly Indians are encamped on the Arkansas, waiting to go over to the general convention of Indians, at Fort Laramie, next August.

The elections in New Mexico are over, and the Legislature was to meet next June. H. N. Smith was elected to the Senate. Much indignation was excited on account of his rejection as Secretary of New Mexico. A large body of Indians are on the Pecos, it is feared, to attack the trains of traders. They are watched by two or three companies of Dragoons. There are many trains all along the route.

There is much sickness in Col. Sumner's command, five and six are dying daily. The Cholera has abated at Independence, and is prevailing at Westport, Mo., again.

A MARVELL—Some folks, in different parts of the country, are puzzling their brains to account for the fact, that although Pennsylvania Whigery has long talked of Gen. Scott in terms almost of idolatry; and although the late Whig State Convention formally nominated him for the Presidency; not one of the leading Whig organs has had a word to say about the proceedings of the Convention on this head. We see no cause for wonder in such a state of things. Those papers print the laws of the United States "By Authority," and it is surprising that "the Ass knight's master's crib" it was not thought so a few hundred years ago.—Pittsburgh Post.

The Lowell News says that a girl was refused admittance to her work in the mill, on one of the corporations, because she was dressed in the Bloomer costume. On being told that if she would come dressed as she ought, she could go in, she thanked her informant, at the same time informing him she didn't care about going in at all.

NEW AND IMPORTANT DISCOVERY.—Many new and valuable mineral and other discoveries are making in New Mexico; and since that now belongs to the United States, we must naturally feel the deeper interest in these developments of nature. A Mr. Gorman, assistant Marshal, who was recently engaged in taking the census of that territory, discovered in his investigations in the town of Chimalillo, in Rio Arriba county, a substance resembling soap. It makes, as is said, a lather like soap, and has the property of removing grease spots or stains out of any kind of cloth. When put into water, it immediately slacks like lime.

At the place where the discovery was first made, it is even with the surface, and about fifteen yards square. It is rotten on top to the depth of about three feet, but appears cleaner and sounder at a greater depth. It can be taken out in larger lumps, of ten or fifteen pounds weight. It is white as snow, and seems to exist in large quantities. Specimens have been forwarded to the Census Office at Washington.—This is truly a curiosity worthy of record.

BRIDGE PROPOSALS. SEALED proposals for the construction of a Bridge across Silver Creek in the township of Nelson in the lower village of Garrettsville, will be received by the Commissioners of Portage County, at the Auditor's office in Ravenna until the 19th day of July, A.
