CITY & NEWS ITEMS.

THURSDAY MORNING, SEPT. 30, 1858. IMPROVEMENTS.—ELEGANT DWELLING HOUSE.

Among the many new buildings in process of erection in this city—there are none that for neatness and elegance of design and finish, will surpass that now being built on the corner of Prospect and Huntington streets by Mr. Charles Leavitt, late of Quincy, Ill.

The material is such as has never been used in this city, or in fact in any place—as the quarry has been but recently opened. It is a very fine, clear sandstone of a peculiar drab slate color, and is obtained from the quarry at Akron, Summit Co.

From comparison with the Connecticut brown stone so much used for building purposes in New York, its superiority is very readily seen, and both in fineness of the grain, and its freedom from all foreign matter. The stone has been subjected to chemical tests and pronounced very durable.

Both as to color (which is the most beautiful of any stone we know of) and liability to decay. Specimens of it were on exhibition by Mr. Leavitt at the State Fair and a special Committee was appointed to test its merits and make a report before January. This stone must, we think, come to be in great demand, as it is both lasting and handsome, and is procured at a convenient distance from the Lake, on which it may be shipped to Buffalo and other cities at small cost.

The buildings Mr. Leavitt is erecting consist of a main and back dwelling house and a carriage house.

The main building, fronting on Prospect St. is built of the above stone and is 28 1/2 by 28 ft. in size. It is connected by an open hall with the rear building which is of brick and 30 by 40 ft. in size. The carriage house is of brick, 25 by 25 ft. in size.

The foundations are laid deep in the ground and upon that, in the front building, three courses of Independence stone are laid, forming a very pleasing contrast with the dark stone which then completes the walls to the roof—On the East and West sides, are deep bays which add much to the beauty of the building. The carved caps for the windows present a very fine appearance and that over the front entrance with the brackets to match, is especially rich in design and execution. The buildings are to be two stories, or twenty-nine feet in height.

The interior will be tasty and elegant but as is the case with the exterior, nothing gaudy will be allowed. The front entrance opens into a wide hall passing through to the rear building, on the left of which will be two parlors opening into each other by folding doors, and on the right, a conservatory 11 by 20 ft., and a large bedroom with bath room adjoining. From this hall we pass into another which extends through the house from East to West separating the kitchen, dining rooms, &c. from the sitting rooms. This rear building is supplied with a spacious basement, store rooms, &c. Piazza extend along both sides of this portion of the building.

The plan of the houses was made by Mr. Leavitt and reflects much credit upon his skill and taste.

The stone work is done by Messrs. Doll & Young and will be a standing and a speaking advertisement of their workmanship.

Mr. Alexander Forbes having the carpenter work under his direction and personal superintendence, has contributed not a little to the fine appearance of every part. The designs of the moldings are Mr. Forbes, and his work throughout is a better recommendation than we can give.

The brick work is under the management of Mr. Vigil Hoffman whose reputation is well sustained in its execution. The whole will form one of the finest buildings to be found in the city, and will add very much to the attractiveness of this part of the Forest City.

MEAN AND ANNOT. Notwithstanding the Springfield Evening News devotes a column to the extinguishment of the Alert Hose Company of Cleveland and the local editor of the LEADER. WARREN CORRESPONDENCE. The Fair at Burton.—Improvement.—Horse Shows on Saturday—Great excitement.—Ladies Riding, &c.

WARREN, Sept. 27, 1858. EDITOR DAILY LEADER.—Your correspondent had the pleasure of attending the Geauga County Agricultural Fair, at Burton, on Thursday and Saturday of last week. It was very much of a gratification indeed, to meet old and new friends, and to behold the material progress made by the Farmers and Mechanics of the rural county of Geauga. Their Fair was a grand success. It was a surprise to your correspondent. He had seen and known something of the Fairs of Geauga county in 1850-51 and '52; and to see this Fair—to look through the very large collection of thoroughbred animals, to see the great strides made in mechanics and manufactures, to witness the evidence of improvement in the products of farm and dairy, and to see all around you the best evidence of the progress in the domestic industry of the people, was one of the best features of this Fair to him, and furnished matter for contemplation.

The grounds of the Society have been well selected, and arranged with an eye to convenience, comfort and adaptation, and are certainly better arranged for the purpose than any grounds of which I have any knowledge. The buildings are substantial and convenient, as well as tasteful and elegant. The whole arrangements for the Fair were well conceived and as well executed, and everything moved like clock work. The attendance was very large on Thursday and nearly as large on Saturday, and in this large concourse of people there was no disturbance, no noise or confusion; but all were quiet and orderly. It is very rare indeed that you will see so large a collection of people together where like order will be observed, and it undoubtedly was due to the perfect arrangement of the officers, as well as the fact that no spirituous liquors were sold on or about the grounds. The whole affair reflected much credit upon the Executive Committee, Superintendent of grounds and the other officers.

The exhibition of stock was quite large and showed evidence of great improvement in that department. The Devonshire take the lead in Geauga county. They are accustomed much the best for working oxen, while as milkers they are fair, yielding a moderate flow of milk, but of a superior quality. This breed was first introduced by Judge Blish, of Lake county, from whom most of the stock raisers of Geauga have obtained their start. There was a large display of Devons.
