MAINE DEMOCRATIC CONVENTION.

LATEST FROM CHARLESTON. DATES TO THE FOURTH. Everything Progressing Favorably. MAINE DEMOCRATIC CONVENTION. PORTLAND, Me., August 6. The Democratic State Convention met to-day. 900 delegates were present. Resolutions were adopted in substance as follows:

1. All men, irrespective of party, are invited to unite for the termination of the calamities which now depress our distracted and unhappy land.

2. The Union was formed in Fraternity and concession, and cannot exist in the absence of that brotherly spirit.

3. We will earnestly support every Constitutional measure tending to preserve the Union of States; we cannot, therefore, support the present Administration, whose course is destructive to the Union and the Government.

4. The war is now being conducted not for the restoration of the Union, but for the destruction of the Republic.

5. Under our form of Government our sovereignty is vested in the people, and rests upon no other foundation than their will; the people are the only lawful sovereigns, and the public functionaries are their servants.

6. The part of the rebel States, if a disposition is shown to return, they should be welcomed back with all their dignity, equality and rights, unimpaired.

7. Resolution denounces arbitrary arrests. 8. Asserts freedom of speech and of the press. 9. Denounces the Censorship Law as unjust; but counsels obedience to it unless the Courts decide it unconstitutional.

10. Endorses the course of Governor Seymour of New York. 11. Commends our soldiers and says they are worthy our nation's gratitude. Hon. B. Bradbury of Eastport, candidate of last year, was nominated for private secretary to the Convention.
