MR. JOHNSON'S RECORD.

How he Requests Treason and its Proper Punishment.

We print below extracts from speeches delivered by President Johnson in Congress just prior to the outbreak of the war.

In his speech to the Illinois Delegation, a few days since, the President stated to them that his part comes in public life what that future action will be may be judged from these extracts. They breathe the spirit of constant and unswerving devotion to the Union, and of fixed and unalterable determination that treason must be punished.

These were his views before treason had waged a four years' war—had starved and tortured our prisoners—had murdered the head of the nation. It is not probable he will change his views much, now that treason has perpetrated these enormities. The following are the extracts alluded to.

Mr. President, I was going to remark, in reference to a general allusion to treason, that if individuals were pointed out to me who were engaged in nightly conspiracies, in secret conclaves, and issuing orders directing the capture of our enemies, and the taking of custom houses, I would show who were the traitors; and that being done, the persons pointed out, coming within the perjury and scope of the provisions of the law, and which I have already mentioned, I would execute them. Sir, treason must be punished. Its enormity, and the extent and depth of its offense must be made known. The time is not far distant, if the Government is preserved, its Constitution is preserved, its honor is preserved, when some of the traitors who are now in the land, shall be executed.
