Discontinuation of Mail Services by Contractors.

The Post Master General has ordered the Contractors on three routes leading to and from this town to each discontinue one of their trips. Hereafter, on the Shelby route, the Wednesday and Thursday trips will be omitted. The Oberlin mail will be reduced from a Tri to a Semi-Weekly. On the Loudonville route the Wednesday and Thursday trips will be omitted.

This necessity is the result, it will be remembered, of a successful intrigue of the Republican leaders in the late Congress in defeating the Appropriation for defraying the expenses of the Post Office Department for the current year. They hoped by this to force the President to call an Extra Session of Congress, which assembling before certain Democratic States had held their elections, would give the organization of the House of Representatives into their hands. In the end they sought to attain, however, they have been followed by the wisdom, courage and rigid economy of the Administration. Mr. Holt will have the unparalleled honor of having triumphantly conducted his Department through a year of monetary famine forced upon him by the enemies of his party and his country. But he can smile at the rage of his enemies. The People, whose mail facilities are temporarily strangled, will make no mistake by putting the saddle upon the wrong horse.

The People of Ashland county have stood by JAMES BUCHANAN from the day of his nomination at Cincinnati, unflinchingly, and they were ever more devoted to him and his able and faithful colleagues than now. The Causes of the War.

There are a great variety of theories as to the causes of the war, according to the stand point of the spectator, and the date at which he commences his observations. Rev. Dr. Baird, who is well acquainted with European affairs, writes from Henderson, Ky., to the N. Y. Observer, as follows: "The real cause of the present war is to be found in the Northwest of Italy. One of the noblest governments which ever existed in Europe, with a constitution like that of England; a Parliament of two Houses, entire freedom of religion—so that Protestant churches are springing up in Turin, Pignerol, Genoa, Nice, Novara, Alessandria (with its immense fortifications), Casale and other places; and Bible and religious books and tracts are circulating in all directions—liberty of the press, and admirable systems of common schools, and great activity in making railroads and developing the resources of the kingdom. It is the existence of such a government in Italy, and contiguous to the Lombardo Venetian kingdom of Austria, that is the occasion, or the cause rather, of this war."

In reply to remarks made by M. Plichon, on the French Legislative Assembly, May 24, on the question of a loan of 500,000,000 for the prosecution of the war in Italy, M. Baroche, President of the Council of State, gave the following statement of the origin of the war: "Why, in fact, is France waging war? Because she has been attacked. France had declared that if Austria attacked Piedmont, she was pledged to aid the latter. She had said that and nothing more. Europe knows with what constant moderation France has received all propositions which could conduce to the maintenance or peace—diplomatic intervention, any English propositions for a Congress, the Government of the Emperor accepted everything. Who made a proposal to Piedmont which described as 'criminal' Austria. After her solemn declaration that if Piedmont were attacked, she would defend that country, France must needs consider her honor assailed in that of Piedmont. She can not forget, in fine, that Piedmont is her ally, that Piedmont holds the key to the Alps, that the Alps are our frontier, and that if Piedmont is attacked, France should be held by a friendly Power—was France to recoil before the menace of an invasion addressed to Piedmont? No. It was impossible."

The Hon. Lion Boyd, Democratic candidate for Lieutenant-Governor of Kentucky, has recovered from his sickness, which confined him for a long time in Philadelphia, and has returned to his home.

Gen. Sam Houston has accepted the nomination of Governor of Texas, tendered him by the Independent Convention at Austin.
