Farmers, you are required to report to the United States Assessors all cattle, hogs, calves and sheep which you slaughter for sale. The tax on each head of horned cattle is forty cents, on each hog ten cents, and on each calf five cents. Reports must be made during the first ten days of each month. Persons failing to make returns as required by law, subject themselves to a severe penalty.
