The Dry Tortugas.

There are several islands bearing the name of Tortugas. The "Dry Tortugas" constitutes an island group and bank in the Gulf of Mexico, about 120 miles west of Cape Sable, in Florida. There are ten islets, or keys in all. They consist of a coral formation, and have very little vegetation, except mangrove bushes. On one of them, known as "Bush Key" and "Garden Key," a light-house has been erected. At the beginning of the rebellion, the government undertook the construction of Fort Jefferson, and sent thither refractory persons to work upon the fortifications. They are too remote from any populated place to enable them to obtain means of escape; too desolate to invite trading vessels; and all articles of food must be supplied by government transports. The place furnishes a secure rather than an attractive place of residence.

A Mistake.

The South did not go to War to destroy the Constitution and overthrow the Government, as is alleged by some. She sought to withdraw from the Union, and because the Federal Government interposed forcibly to prevent this, she undertook to fight her way out of the Union.—Statesman.
