> The Dry Tortugas. There are several islands bearing the name of Tortugas. The "Dry Tortugas" constitutes an island group and bank in the Gulf of Mexico, about 120 miles west of Cape Sable, in Florida. There are ter islets, or keys in all. They consist of a coral formation, and have very little veg-etation, except mangrove bushes. On one of them, known as "Bush Key" and "Garden Gey," a light-house has been erected. At the beginning of the rebellion, the government undertook the construction of Fort Jefferson, and sent thither refractory persons to work upon the fortifications. They are too remote from any populated place to enable pris-oners to obtain means of escope; too des-olate to invite trading vessels; and all articles of food must be supplied by govern.
